My Fellow MD6 Lions,

As the pandemic is coming towards an end, it is great to see how Lions Clubs coped during the pandemic. When the news is all doom and gloom—as it has been since the outbreak of the coronavirus—it's hard for even the most optimistic among us to stay positive. Instead, we have found ways to meet the needs of our communities.

Facing adversity and meeting the needs of our communities in an everchanging environment is not new for Lions. Many Club leaders kept positive through the pandemic and kept the mindset of the Lions mission and committed to continuing to serve during this period. They did so without letting panic enter into their decisions and ensuring that they were making decisions based on fact, not rumor, which will allow them to continue serving in an uninterrupted manner.

In this unprecedented situation, Clubs have rapidly and creatively responded with alternative ways to continue to serve their communities and carry out their missions. Some changes might be short-term while others may be successful strategies that become permanent.

When visiting Clubs, I talk about the cost of negativity, and the benefits of positivity. I find it's helpful when dealing with Club members to make a logical case for positivity. But most importantly I shared how Positive Leaders stay positive to create positive change... and today I want to share a few of these principles/practices with you.

- Control What You Can Control It's simple but it's true. You can't control what people are saying and thinking about you. You can't control most things in life but you can control your attitude, your effort and your actions.
- 2) Focus on Solutions instead of Complaints When things are not going well and you are being bombarded with negativity it's easy to complain. But great leaders don't complain. They focus on solutions. If you are complaining, you are not leading. If you are leading you aren't complaining. Instead of focusing on where you are, think about where you want to go and what you want to create. Instead of complaining about what's holding you back, think about solutions that will propel you forward.
- 3) **Embrace Change** There's a myth that members don't like change. We actually like what change produces. We just don't like the messy transition required to create the change. Individuals and organizations that thrive embrace the entire process of transition and change knowing it leads to improvement and growth. Leadership is a transfer of belief so it's essential that a leadership team shares their positive belief about change with everyone in the Club. (Continued on following page)

**4) Stay Positive and Do the Work** - It may sound cliché but it's a huge key to success. Through challenges, adversity and negativity you must simply stay positive and continue to do the work. You control what you control. Tune out the noise. Focus on solutions. Work hard every day. Embrace change, work together as a team, and create positive change from the inside out. Over time performance improves, the numbers rise, confidence grows, members feel and see the change and then everyone starts talking about why you are succeeding instead of failing.

One of the biggest decisions I had to make during my year is how to do the State Convention. With the State and County Regulations it would have been easy just to cancel but like all Lions Clubs this year I thought outside the box and recruited a Lion that was not afraid of a challenge and BIG LION ROAR to Lion John Spice to make it happen.



The Goals for District 6C remain the same in spite of the Corona Virus and the effect it had on providing "NORMAL" service to our communities. We remain confident in our ability to recruit new members and increase our donations to LCIF.



I am glad to report that our goals were reviewed to determine where if any place they required tweaking or changed due to our limited ability to travel

within our communities. Although no changes were recommended, it was decided that we would increase our communications to each other to ensure that all were well. It was also decided that we would ensure that members would get the training required to accomplish their jobs in spite of the travel and occupancy rules of the locality they live in via ZOOM. Many of our members are finding ways to provide service to our communities, assisting food banks, blood drives, donations, and virus testing. For example, members of the Cyber Lions are volunteering to assist in testing for the virus. Lion Mark Hamouz has led in the construction and delivery of Desks for Kids and the construction of book cases for a new senior citizen housing facility.

We have 28 clubs, all participating, and performing to the best of their capabilities to serve physically, financially, or in other ways safely. A loud ROAR to PDG Gwen Balk (LCIF Coordinator) (Centennial Airport Lions), who has made over 1000 masks with all of the proceeds (\$1200.00) being donated to LCIF.

I will remind all clubs that if needed, there are funds available in the budget to assist in the payment of dues. Also a reminder that Lion Ann Marie Morgan as District Administrator (Nederland Lions) will gladly assist you in reporting using MyLCI the service projects as well as reporting service projects and changes to or new club officers.

I am happy to announce that 72 members received Charter Monarch and Monarch Chevron Award recognition from LCI. The awards were sent to each club to be presented at an appropriate time.

The 2021 Lions Clubs International Convention will be virtual due to continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Information is available on line on how to register.

District 6C Convention will be held on April 10,2021. Our Committee Chair will provide additional information.





There were 15 1<sup>st</sup> VDGs and our group leader Past DG Dennis Kelly III from MD5M, Minnesota. We had several from Australia, Philippines, Canada, and others from across the USA (Hawaii, Arkansas, Texas, and Colorado). Our training starts in April through May 2021, so we are gathering on Zoom to get to know each other better.

I have been attending club Zoom meetings as I find out about them. In January, I attended Monday webinars about the North American Membership Initiative. I have been working on district goals for 2021-2022 and now I must put together the action plans for them. Afterwards, I will get the district Global Action Team together to tweak them before I send them into Lions Clubs International (LCI) headquarters.

This year, the LCI Convention will be virtual so it would be a great opportunity to register for it and attend an international convention.

Registration fees – The registration fee will be US \$50 until March 31, then US \$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US \$30 regardless of date. The convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.

Over the past two years I have noticed a lack of high-quality training for our future leaders. Our multiple districts have done a great job with the Paul Barbour Regional Lions Leadership Institute (RLLI). Yet when it comes to our vice district governors, we fall short. Because what I have witnessed is the same repeat of RLLI training they had in Paul Barbour RLLI. There is a separate training for 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG and 1<sup>st</sup> VDG that should be used to prepare our future District Governors. I propose that we move away from the regional Vice District Governor training held in the spring. If it is going to

to continue to use the RLLI materials, then we do our own training of our VDGs in the fall of the year (October or November). Maybe it can be done in conjunction with the Fall Council of Governors. I just feel we need to give our new leaders every advantage as possible to succeed. It is worth our efforts to do this. We need to grow our membership by making sure our District Governors are ready to lead and not just hold a slot. With Lions Clubs International (LCI) putting more pressure on the multiple districts to train leaders, we need to step up to the challenge. We have several Lions that are Faulty Development Institute (FDI) trained so we need to use them. At least there needs to be an open discussion about this. I would love to host a Zoom meeting to explore what is happening with Regional VDG Training.







#### **DISTRICT 6W STAYS ACTIVE**

District 6W has continued to stay active through the winter months, even though travel has been curtailed. Personally, I have not been able to visit my last 7 clubs, but I have contacted a number of club officers to touch base and see how they're doing, if they need any help. We were able to provide some relief funds for members and service activities to some of the clubs.

Thanks to our GLT, PCC Lance Balding, **5 of our district leaders became Certified Guiding Lions in January**. With some homework and a good Zoom session, followed by the CGL test, Lions PCC Lance Balding,

DG Paul Steinfort, 1VDG JoAnn Steinfort, 2VDG Dave Mcllnay, and Region Chair/Cabinet Treasurer Ed Smith all received their certificates. As we continue to work on new clubs and build existing clubs, we'll be able to use these Lions to help guide the efforts.

Our LCIF goal for 6W has been 100% club participation, and at least matching last year's district totals. We may still reach both goals, although many clubs are re-arranging their budgets due to lost fund-raisers. 6W will show at least 5-6 new MJF's by the end of



the year. And congratulations to my own club, the Eagle Lions Club, for committing to become an **LCIF Campaign 100 Model Club** (commitment of \$500 per member through the Campaign).

District 6W – along with District 15 Wyoming – applied for and **received \$75,000 matching grants from LCIF**. That \$150,000 was thus doubled, and the monies have been earmarked for Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute Foundation to fund an additional exam room at the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute in anticipation of increasing demand for its vision saving and preserving services. We're happy and proud to be able to help.

While a number of clubs are now meeting again in person, Zoom has been a big help to our clubs and district. We held two **virtual zone meetings** in February, and asked that Lions join either one; we have an in-person zone meeting in the works. March will include a **virtual cabinet meeting and two seminars on membership growth**, recruitment, member satisfaction, etc.

Even while not meeting, most of our clubs continue to serve. We've increased the number of secretaries and service chairs who report, and our district service chair (GST) and district administrator have provided help in many instances. 100% of our Lions and Leo clubs have now been able to report, and even with fewer activities from some clubs, our numbers exceed last year's already in most categories. District Leaders in Reporting Metrics are as follows, top 3 each category: (Continued on following page)

We started with 6 branch members (and even added a new member to our regular member roles), and are committed to adding more to this family.

The branch name is "Ability Advocates of the Rockies Lions Club Branch." 4 of the members are blind or low-vision. The branch's mission is to educate the Lions Clubs and the communities in our district about the issues, challenges, and needs of blind/low-vision people in their communities. It is a virtual, specialty club branch with members living so far in Grand Junction, New Castle, Edwards, and Buena Vista.

It's a dynamic group and we hope to see great things. Because of the nature of our geography and population scarcity here in 6W, the club branch is a logical way to grow our clubs and thus our district. We hope to have more such growth moving forward.



#### PRESTIGIOUS INTERNATIONAL AWARD TO 6W CLUB

Congratulations to the Fraser River Valley Lions Club named in January as the recipient of the prestigious Lions International Kindness Matters Service Award. 2019-20 was the first year of this award, and only 18 were available to Lions internationally.

This prestigious award is given annually to a handful of Lions and Leo clubs for performing an outstanding service project in one of our global cause areas. Nominated at the club level and then the district and multiple district levels, the Kindness Matters Service Award is a "challenge for Lions and Leos to develop exceptionally innovative and creative service projects with the aim of leaving a positive impact in their communities".

The Fraser River Valley Lions Club partnered with Mountain Family Center, the central human services organization in Grand County, to give the community a valuable resource to teach how to cook healthier meals, especially for people with diabetes. They applied for and received an LCIF grant, along with the Jackson County Lions, and ultimately paid for the construction of a teaching kitchen at the MFC and training for a teacher of these diabetic centric classes that new serve two large counties.

The Mountain Family Center helped over 9,000 food-challenged people in need in 2019 with food distribution and other services. It was critical for the growing number of diabetics in the area to understand how to get the healthiest results from the food being donation. This project and the club's continued support of MFC has provided one of the strongest branding efforts in our district in recent years. NOTE: Fraser River Valley Lions continues to help the MFC in a variety of ways, especially with several thousands of dollars of donations during the pandemic challenges to reach more people.

6W/MD6 Service Chair FVDG JoAnn Steinfort and DG Paul Steinfort were aware of these efforts and encouraged President Greg Orzech and the club to apply, knowing that it met the following criteria (and was reported on MyLion as required): Did the project

- Benefit one of our five global causes (diabetes, the environment, vision, childhood cancer or hunger)?
- Demonstrate innovation?
- Achieve impact of scale and long-term sustainability?
- Develop local partnerships?
- Use local Lions/Leo or Lions Clubs International resources?

The club's application was approved by the 6W cabinet and then by the MD6 Council this past fall. Clubs are encouraged to look at the Guide and requirements on the following link, and see if they have a service activity that qualifies. If so, make the effort to apply. #### **DEFINING YOUR SERVICE WITH DONATIONS**

Did you know that donations can count as a service activity? A donation is a service to the organization or individual to whom you just gave a check. You are contributing funds needed for them to continue in their endeavors. By including your donations to Leader Dogs Intl., Boy Scouts, scholarships or whatever your club donated along with your club's other service reporting to Lions Clubs International you are increasing the amount of service activities. So, for every check you write, your club performed a service.

For instance, a \$1000 donation to Colorado Lions Camp includes your club's Lion volunteers and their hours. So, if your club has a meeting to set up the club's budget, count the number of Lions (8) at that meeting and multiply one-half hour for that portion of the meeting which comes to 4 volunteer hours. Also, the time includes the bookkeeping work of the Treasurer to write and send out the check. Hours or funds are always rounded up to the next whole number. The number of people served is based on your best guess or what the organization will help you determine. Some entities have a formula for number of people served for every \$100. A Colorado Lions Camp \$1000 donation may only pay for one campership and some craft supplies. Then your report would be as follows: Activity Level – Club, Activity Type-- Service Activity, Signature Activity --Yes, Cause--Other, Project type—Other, People Served—6, Total Volunteers—8, Total Vol. Hours--5, Funds Donated--\$1000, Organization—Colorado Lions Camp.

Remember a <u>signature activity</u> is one that your club is well known for and done on a regular basis. Review some of your regular projects and make sure to designate them as such in your reporting.

Reporting has gotten so much easier. It is sometimes best to get all the information needed and report the activity as a "Past Service Activity". Some Lions will go in and set up an activity but then forget to update the report with volunteer numbers and hours, how many people were served, etc. All this information goes into the metrics at LCI. If the report is incomplete and sits there as a draft, it does not get counted in the metrics. LCI and District leaders review those metrics to get a profile of what is going on out there in the world of Lionism. Make sure your project gets counted!! (Continued on following page)

#### **Dear Lion Leader,**

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic is continuing to impact the work of Lions around the world. As you know, it has also created financial hardships for our Lions and the people for whom we care.

To support the incredible men and women serving with us, the International Board of Directors unanimously passed another resolution to help our clubs.

Here is an overview of the new resolution approved by the Board of Directors:

- **Charter and entrance fees waiver** We have waived all charter and entrance fees from January 1 through June 30, 2021.
- Flexible payments No clubs in good standing on December 31, 2020 will be suspended or canceled through June 30, 2021 for late payment of dues. Full payment is required to be received before June 30, 2021 to avoid suspension or cancellation.
- **Please note** that clubs placed on financial suspension on December 31, 2020 will remain on suspension until the full balance is paid. Those clubs will still need to address their outstanding dues or make arrangements for repayment with the Accounts Receivable Department at Lions Clubs International to avoid cancellation scheduled for March 1, 2021.

These additional measures will help Lions facing financial hardships and give our clubs the support and encouragement they need during these challenging times. For more than a century, Lions have taken on the greatest challenges facing humanity, and together, we will overcome this.

The world needs Lions now more than ever, so thank you for your outstanding service and commitment to our communities and the world.

Currently, the Institute is closed to all 'non-essential' personnel and activities but patient services and much of the RMLEI Research continues, so to our board is looking toward the future and our next objective.

We have formed a Planning Committee, with input from the medical leaders of the Institute, to explore areas that RMLEIF can best contribute to the advancement of our mission to the support in all areas including patient care, education and research.

As with many Lions Clubs, we are looking forward to meeting in-person once again, checking out all the new hairstyles that may have cropped up and exchanging thoughts and ideas that have come out of our on-line meetings.

As a reminder, RMLEIF will partner with individuals and Clubs and provide funding for either initial eye examinations in the Low Vision Clinic at the Institute or travel expenses to any eye clinic for patients that may require financial help.



Web accessibility encompasses all disabilities that affect access to the Web, including: auditory, cognitive, neurological, physical, speech and visual. As "Vision" is one of the main tenets of Lions International, all Colorado Lions websites and online documents should be accessible by those with disabilities.

A "<u>Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG)</u>" webpage <u>WCAG</u> has been setup to provide an overview, guidelines and tips and tricks for Colorado Lions Web Administrators. We are happy to report that the **Colorado Lions Foundation** website and the **MD6 Lions State** website are now 100% web accessible for the vision impaired and blind users. This includes all documents, published on the websites, are web accessibility.

We need to continue to update all statewide, district and club websites until we are 100% web accessible. As "**Knights of the Blind**", this should be the least we can do to help those that are blind and with vision impairment.

### Some facts:

Due to the Covid 19 shutdowns, no sorting has been done since March 10, 2020. It is unknown when we can begin again. We did have one shipment of 550 prescription glasses to Ethiopia and received a trailer load of donated glasses from 6 SE this quarter. We are also anticipating a load of donated glasses from Denver/Golden soon.

The Sterling Correctional Facility shut down all volunteer programs on March 12, 2020 due to the Covid 19 outbreak. We have received no processed eye glasses since March 10, so our program is essentially shut down for the time being. We have been sending donated glasses to Logan Industries to be separated.

The company in Missouri that buys a <u>limited</u> amount of prescription sunglasses from us is still generating income for our program. We receive \$400 for each shipment of 5 boxes. He will also purchase Ray Ban, Oakley and Maui Jim prescription, sunglasses and cases as well as "paddle" bowed glasses. Received an additional \$552.00 for the new products in this quarter. That is worth the effort of looking for them.

### **Used Hearing Aids:**

We do take used hearing aids in our collection boxes and either send them on to the Texas Lions Recycling Center or use them in the Sterling Lions Hearing Aid program. LCI carries a Hearing Aid Recycling decal (IAD-19) that can be added to the eyeglass recycling box.

### **Mission Groups:**

<u>If anyone knows of a mission group</u> that wants to take glasses to developing countries, they can contact David Conley at 970-522-1319–home, 970-520-3840-cell, or <u>djconley4313@gmail.com</u> for more

information or an order form. Glasses are FREE and the only expense to the ordering party is shipping the glasses to them. We almost always have enough stock on hand to fulfill any order.

# INTERNATIONAL HEARING DOGS, INC.

Hello to All our Lions Friends!

A lot has happened at International Hearing Dog, Inc (IHDI) over the past year. As in much of our world, 2020 was an interesting, challenging and enormously busy time at IHDI. In March, we created and implemented a Volunteer Foster Home Pilot Project in one short week to ensure the safety and care of our dogs during Colorado's shelter-at-home directive. That was certainly a 2020 highlight (3)! On May 4<sup>th</sup>, as restrictions began loosening, IHDI brought our dogs back to our facility from their foster homes. We were thrilled by all that we have learned from this fostering pilot project. Our dogs experienced profound benefits from a fostering situation. Consequently, we have now launched a Weekend Volunteer Foster Home Program within our dog training program.

In January, just prior to the onset of the Pandemic, the IHDI staff created an exciting Strategic Plan for IHDI. We used the time in the Spring of working at home to tackle that Strategic Plan; researching Best Practices, evaluating current practices, and developing new policies and program design. Another highly significant endeavor was our application to Assistance Dog International (ADI). After an intense application process and multi-level reviews, we were notified in August that we had been granted Candidate Member status! The goal of ADI is to establish and promote standards of excellence in all areas of assistance dog acquisition, training, and partnerships. ADI is THE leading global authority in the assistance dog industry. As a Candidate, IHDI upholds and adheres to all ADI standards and strives to pursue and achieve Accredited Member status within ADI after two years as a successful Candidate program. As a candidate member, IHDI has committed to raising our bar and meeting, or exceeding, the standards set by ADI. As we strive for this level of excellence, we will be adopting several operating procedures recognized by ADI as Best Practices for the assistance dog industry. We are thrilled with the opportunities and potential this provides IHDI.

Due to Covid restriction and risks, in March 2020 we stopped our travel to place dogs. Traveling, and then being in clients' homes and in public spaces for a week at a time became too risky for our trainers and our clients. Further, as the dog/client teams often require additional visits from our trainers during their first six-month transition, we were not able to safely provide that support during the pandemic. Therefore, after careful consideration, we determined that IHDI would not place dogs, at least through the end of 2020, outside of Colorado and that we would not place dogs within Colorado until the end of summer. Consequently, in late August we placed our first dog since the pandemic shut down – Linda and hearing dog Curly. They are thriving together!

Just before the holidays we completed another exciting match – Sue and hearing dog Artie. They are a terrific match. They bonded so quickly and powerfully. The timing was especially significant because Sue had recently lost her husband of 60 years and for the first time was living on her own with no hearing person to help alert. In Sue's words "Artie is my lifeline!" Because of Covid we had to back off matches and it feels so wonderful to be able to really be moving forward again!

Our new Weekend Foster Families have been busy. Over the holidays they fostered dogs for the long Christmas and New Year's weekends as well as over the Long President Day's weekend. We are thrilled with our new Volunteer Foster program. The dogs get a great break from their everyday training routine and are able to have some fun and enriching experiences with their fosters. Equally as important, our trainers are able to receive critical information about how each dog behaved in a real home setting as well as out in the world with a "regular" person rather than a trainer. The feedback is a powerful tool as the trainers identify behavioral patterns and highlight areas that need training focus. If you, or family or friends, would be interested, we are recruiting for Volunteer Foster Homes to take our dogs for a minimum of one weekend per month. In early January we were able to add four new dogs to our training string. They are all labs. It is always a particularly fun time when we introduce new dogs into our training program. They are just beginning the initial evaluation period now, so far too early to know who may or may not succeed; but we have, naturally, fallen in love with each one already (3)! Next week another new dog, a Labradoodle named Pi will be joining IHDI.

We have also been continuously reaching out to our clients and their dogs through tumultuous 2020. Many have been sharing wonderful stories of how their Hearing Dog has been the stabilizing force in their world during the enforced isolation the Pandemic has required. Like most of the country, the new normal has had a great deal of impact on IHDI. We have put many protocols in place to maintain the health and safety of our staff and our recipients while still ensuring the care for, and training of, our dogs.

These are certainly unprecedented times, and we cannot know what the future holds. However, when we look to that future, although we are attuned to our realities, we remain excited for all our possibilities. We have had to create new ways of effectively operating, but we are doing all we can to help keep our communities safe and connected, and we are moving ahead with great gusto, creativity, and gratitude.

Thank You so, so much for believing in, and so generously supporting IHDI's work. May 2021 treat you all well and gently.

### INTERNATIONAL HEARING DOGS (IHDI) PCC ANDY SMITH

IHDI is doing well. Many exciting changes are happening. The Volunteer Weekend Foster Project is doing well. The dogs get a break from their everyday training routine. They have fun and enriching experiences with their Foster Volunteers. There are currently six trained and active Volunteer Foster Families. IHDI asks for a one weekend per month commitment. 20 is their goal of Volunteer Foster families. If you have friends or family who may be interested, let me know and I will forward your name to IHDI.

Hearing dogs and their handlers are required to be tested for Public Access. Hearing Dogs are now required to pass Public Access as part of their Service Dog Certification.

IHDI has been dealing with COVID-19. With one or two staff having people test positive, they were quarantined this past year. With such a small staff, this has had an impact, but it has not stopped IHDI. Staff morale still is high and they are continuing to be productive and effective as a team.

IHDI continues to apply for Grants from various Foundations and other organizations. Colorado Gives Day donations totaled \$23,214.

Total Service club donations were \$30,955.00 for the fiscal year Oct. 2019 to Sept. 2020. Thanks to Lions and Club who may have donated! ROAR!!!

The Walk Run, Wag will not be held again in 2021. Their decision was based on three factors.

- 1. The unknowns around the pandemic.
- 2. Benefit vs. Output. In 2019, it's best year, Walk, Run, Wag raised \$13K with expenses around \$7K. 930 hours of staff time and well over \$24K in payroll expense.
- 3. Messaging. IHDI has become committed to being a people-centered service agency rather than a dog rescue focused agency. IHDI feels a Signature Event should reflect a more people -centered focus. I have asked to be included in discussions on the future of Walk, Run and Wag and other efforts. Maybe Walk, Run, Wag can be done virtually? Any ideas, please contact me at 720-364-8487.

Virtual giving is becoming the norm such as Colorado Gives Day and the King Soopers Sooper Card reward program. You can also donate through the IHDI website.

IHDI has begun work on a new dog play yard at the north end of the building. The dogs can be moved from inside the kennels through the outdoor kennel area into the new play yard. This will eliminate the need to be leashed up and crossing out of fenced area or crossing a parking lot. The dogs will have 4 times the space.

In November 2018, the Lions heard a diabetes awareness presentation by Dr. Rebecca Moore for World Diabetes Day. Hearing that exercise is very beneficial, 14 members took it upon themselves to see how many miles they could walk by World Diabetes Day in November 2019. The participants, called Pride Walkers, logged 8,296 miles in that first year. The accomplishment was measured in red yarn and pinned to a United States map so the participants could see how far their miles walked could take them around the perimeter of the United States - the lower 48. Dr. Moore once again asked the Lions to keep track of their miles for the next 12 months — this time with a challenge to top their number from the first year. At their November 12th meeting, the Pride Walkers were pleased to report they made their goal, with 8,493 miles walked in the past year - measured in blue yarn. The article also mentioned that Diabetes is a focus of Lions Clubs worldwide, the prevalence of Diabetes along with facts from the LCI website, the health affects if not treated timely, the differences in the various types of diabetes along with interviews of Lions telling of their journey for each type and an explanation of, along with our Club's participation in, the 10th Annual Morgan County Sneaker Stroll, which is a district Lions Club event that raises funds for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. They also offer paid work experiences through JOBS 180 and at the Cafe apprentices gain experience cooking and in customer service.
