Karen Harris & Barbara Abbey Alzheimer's Association

Cap Hermann introduced our speakers for today. Both of Cap's parents suffered from Alzheimer's disease. so this topic is very meaningful for him. The walk to support the Alzheimer's Association will be Saturday, September 16th at City Park. Ten club members have volunteered to help set up, and Cap has shirts for them.

Karen Harris, Community Education Coordinator, with our local Colorado chapter of the Alzheimer's Association. spoke to us first, and shared a

video with some facts on the disease.

Five million people suffer from Alzheimer's, and it is the 6th leading cause of death. People think Alzheimer's as memory loss but it affects the whole brain. The question was asked: "How do people die of Alzheimer's?" Once the brain stem is impacted, it can shut down the body's systems. Also, falling and choking can cause death due to the inability of the body to solve problems and protect itself. The disease can take people back in time, with near term memory loss being the first sign.

Dementia is the umbrella term, and Alzheimer's is the most common diagnosis, making up 60-80 percent of dementia cases. Vascular dementia, usually connected with obesity and high blood pressure, is the second highest form of dementia.

One of nine people at age 65 years old will develop Alzheimer's, and one in three at age 85.

The local association provides an 800 number 24hours a day, 7-days per week for caregivers and patients to call, and they answer questions on medications, care communities, and other resources that are available. They serve the whole state of Colorado, and the number is 800-272-3900. There website is http://

There are over 70 association chapters serving communities across the United States. World-wide there are chapters in Europe, Japan, Australian, Taiwan, Korea, China, and Argentina. The Colorado Chapter is the premier source of information and support for the more than 65,000 people living with Alzheimer's in Colorado, their families, and caregivers.

Next week's Walk to End Alzheimer's is Colorado Chapter's #1 fundraiser, which raises \$70M annually, Eighty percent of which comes from individuals. Barbara's job is to find not only financial support, but also to find volunteers. Over 6,000 people have registered for the walk at no cost—though they are encouraged to fundraise. She anticipates 10,000 people will be in City Park. Last year's event was number six in the United States size wise.
