Over 800 students, the most ever, qualified to participate in the State contest. Unfortunately, 30 people who had volunteered to serve as judges for the event failed to show up. This caused a great deal of confusion and schedule-juggling by the organizers in order to make sure there was a team of judges for each grouping of projects. Three MSOC members did show up and serve as judges: Everett Gardner, Joe Marci, and **Karl Geil**. History Day competitors choose a topic related to the annual theme, which this year is "Taking a Stand" in History," and prepare a research paper, an exhibit, a website, a documentary, or an original stage performance. The top two in each category move on to the national competition at the University of Maryland. This year, two projects from our Super Citizen partner, Hamilton Middle School, were sent on to national, and another entry from Hamilton was the alternate in its category.
