
way. Tom was cautious on what he said, since he was sitting in his kitchen and his wife Laura was making ready for Easter.



Highlights Mid-20th Century Popular Music

Paul Simon extends an invitation MSOC members to join his online course called "Highlights of Mid-20th Century Popular Music," that will take place online from 1-3 p.m. for 8 Tuesdays starting April 21st. It is offered through the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI), a non-profit unit of the University of Denver, which cancelled its Spring term because of the coronavirus and has built a new online pro-



gram. Paul has two co-facilitators for this course, which will explore folk, blues, folk-rock, and other genres of music in the 1940, 50s, and 60s. The classes normally limited to OLLI members have been opened to friends and family of

facilitators and managers because of online capabilities (Zoom). Go to portfolio.du.edu/ollionline to see the catalog and to register for his class and others of interest. The course fees are about \$4.50 an hour and can be seen when you go to online registration. Paul manages OLLI East in Aurora and has facilitated courses in the last year on '60s Music, Current Events, and the British Royal Navy during the Napoleonic War. Registration will close on April 17th.

The Optimist Creed Shared by George Buzick

Most active Optimist members know the first ten tenets of "The Optimist Creed." But did you know that the original had twelve, not ten verses? Written by Christian D. Larson, a prolific writer of the early 1900's. "Promise Yourself." first appeared in 1912 in a book entitled "Your Forces and How to Use Them."

For some unknown reason, newspaper, and magazine editors across America frequently omitted the last two lines of "Promise Yourself," as well as the author's name. Which is why Jim Westervelt, Secretary/Treasurer of the Optimist Club of Los Angeles published the 10-tenet version of "Promise Yourself" in the club newsletter in 1919. Members of the club liked the inspirational poem so much that they began reciting it at each of their meetings.

At the 1922 Optimist Convention in Kansas City, delegates adopted "Promise Yourself" as the official Creed of The Optimist Club. Since that time, this version has been known as "The Optimist Creed," even though no one knew who had originally written it.

Members of the Los Angeles Optimist Club later discovered that Christian Larson was the author and also found out about the additional verses. Mr. Larson was contacted and graciously gave the Optimist Club permission to use the 10-verse version of "Promise Yourself" as The Optimist Creed.

THE OPTIMIST CREED

Promise Yourself...

- To be so strong that nothing can disturb your peace of mind.
- To talk heath happiness and prosperity to every person you meet.
- To make your friends feel that there is something worthwhile in
- To look at the sunny side of everything and make your optimism
- To think only of the best, to work only for the best and to expect only the best.
- To be just as enthusiastic about the success of others as you are about your own.
- To forget the mistakes of the past and press on to the greater achievements of the future.
- To wear a cheerful countenance at all times and give a smile to every living creature you meet.
- To give so much time to the improvement of yourself that you have no time to criticize others.
- To be too large for worry, too noble for anger, too strong for fear and to happy to permit the presence of trouble.

The following words were a part of the original "Promise Yourself" by Christian Larson, but not included in the "Optimist Creed."

- To think well of yourself and to proclaim this fact to the world, not in loud words, but in great deed.
- To live in the faith that the whole world is on your side, so long as you are true to the best that is in you.

As part of a range rationalization the Bentley S1 is very similar, apart from its radiator grille.


We would like to have more people participate, so we will be providing a hint with the questions.
