## In Remembrance of Don St. John

In last weeks GUMS the passing of Don St. John was



reported. In that article it was mentioned that the Club celebrated <u>Don St. John Day</u> during **Craig Eley's** Presidency. Craig corrected the editors and shared that Don St. John Day was declared by the Mayor to be July 26, 2013. That was a Friday, and it was at that meeting that we held

Don St John Day. At that time **Paul Simon** was club president and he served as MC.

Craig also shared his interview he had with Don a couple of weeks before so he could give a brief biography of Don. Below is Craigs write-up

> Don St. John Biography By Craig Eley, July 26, 2013



Don is a Denver native, having been born in St. Anthony hospital. In 1936, when Don was 8months, old his mother was ill, and Don and his sister and 2 brothers were dropped off by their father at the Denver Orphan's Home at Colfax & Albion.

Don's mother later passed away, and Don remained in the orphan's home until 1946, when he was 11 years old. Don says he has only good memories of his years at the orphan's school. There was plenty of food, even during the De-

pression, and he had lots of kids to play with.

The home had its own elementary school, which eventually closed, and then Don attended Teller Elementary for a year.

During part of this time, Don's father served in WW II, and when he returned he collected Don and his siblings and moved to Junction City, Kansas. After 8-months the family returned to Colorado and lived on Don's uncle's ranch in Dillon. Don continued his education, riding a horse each day to a one room schoolhouse.

After a year in Dillon, Don went to live with his uncle on another ranch he owned in Fraser. Again, Don rode a horse to school.

Don and his father moved around a bit after that, and when he was in  $9^{th}$  grade Don was placed in the Denver Boys Home at #9 Pearl Street. Don attended Byers Jr. High, and he made friends with a boy named Bill Engle.

They got along so well that one day Bill told his family that he wanted to move into the Denver Boy's Home so he could live with Don. Bill's father suggested an alternative – that Don come live with the Engles.

So through the generosity of the Engle family, Don left the Boy's Home and lived with them at 125 Washington St. and later at 1381 E. Center until he graduated from South High School in 1953. It was at South that Don met Harlan Riffel and Coy Horton, who went on to become valued members of Monaco South.

After high school, Don, Coy, and Harlan all went into the Marines, but they were not stationed together. Don was sent to 29 Palms, California, where he worked as an accountant. Don got out of the service in 1957, and the following year began working at a Commerce City refinery owned by Tenneco. During his 44 years at the refinery, it changed hands 10 times.

Don started as a laborer, and served as the chairman of the refinery's union for a number of years. He attended college at night, earning a bachelor degree and a master's degree with a focus on Latin American history.

In 1975 Don was promoted to management at the refinery, becoming the Directory of Personnel and Safety. His job was later redefined to Corporate Safety Director. As safety director, Don was involved in litigation with the federal Occupational Safety & Health Administration, and had to spend 6 months in court (this is probably more courtroom experience than most lawyers ever get).

Don later became the Industrial Relations Manager for five refineries. Part of his job was negotiating labor contracts with the unions.

Don met Char at the Aurora Lounge one evening in 1958. They were married two years later, and have two daughters - Pam, the principal of Horizon High School, and Diane, the office manager of a Denver law firm. Both are Thomas Jefferson High School graduates. They also have 5 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren, with one more on the way.

Don retired in 2002, and he and Char like to spend time at their cabin near Red Feather Lakes. Don describes himself as not being a joiner, but despite that Coy Horton and John Young got him involved in Monaco South in 1994, which Don describes as one of the greatest things that ever happened to him.

As a member of Monaco South, Don organized our MS 150 Rest Stop for many years, has participated in hundreds of activities and projects, and served as our Club President in 2001-02. He currently serves every Friday morning as the breakfast monitor, putting that Marine Corps accounting training to good use.

On the Optimist District level, Don served for 9 years as the Sgt at Arms at District meetings and Conventions. In this capacity, Don was responsible for accoutrements such as flags and banners were in place and cared for, and that the meeting arrangements were satisfactory.

And today, we recognize Don for his exemplary service to the District, Club and community by proclaiming this July 26, 2013 as **Don St. John Day!**
