Kate Donelan Executive Director of Destination Imagination Colorado

Tom Mauro introduced <u>Kate Donelan</u>, Executive Director of Destination Imagination (DI), Colorado, and in turn, Kate introduced <u>Catherine May</u> a DI Team Leader and also past Slaven Elementary School Super Citizen, <u>Kern Karkos</u>, a DI Team Manager, and Catherine's father, <u>David May</u>.

Kate explained that the Destination Imagination (DI) program is built around creative problemsolving and competition teams. It is the Worlds largest academic competition and

totally a "Learner driven learning" protocol. Over 150,000 students participate worldwide. The top four regions are China, Texas, British Columbia, and Colorado. Each student develops their own talent and abilities with the primary focus on their communication skills at every level. The scope of participation is Kindergarten to College. The end game is teamwork cohesion and high-level performance.

In Colorado there are nine regions that compete, that includes Denver-Boulder metro, and Challenges in Challenges in Science, Technology, Engineering, Fine Arts, Improv, Service Learning, and Early Learning.

In the DI Challenge Experience, two to sevenmember teams focus on finding solutions to two separate types of Challenges: Team Challenges and Instant Challenges. Then they present their solutions to Appraisers in Tournament-style settings. By working together to develop solutions, participants push the limits of their imaginations to better themselves and best their competition.

Kate shared a story about a team from Yoder Colorado, that taught their elders how to use a cell phone, that was one of the more interesting subjects. 780 Teams participate and 50 earn entry into the Global Finals. Catherine May shared her history of participation that included an Instant Challenge-Rapid Ideas focus

that targeted how to Supersede Long-term Planning for immediate answers. She said, "my 6th and 8th grade teams taught me a lot, in fact my 5-6th grade teams went to the Global Finals!" She mentioned she has learned how to work is a team with her closest friends and how to problem solving and plan a bicameral project. Her passion is to work in building

and related skills including the use of power tools and basic construction. "It has been wonderful and I am so happy to be part of the program," she said. "In the 6th grade she learned how to build a musical instrumentxylophone and an electric train. The second challenge was how to build a vehicle. In the 7th grade it was a fine arts challenge, and last year we ended with a service project in the form of a clothing drive with over 2,000 pieces collected." She explained that her team had to sort clothing taking two months and to then store that inventory in a robot that they had to build. They won an award as a result of their ingenuity and focused effort. Over the years the team has basically remained the same in 4th, 5th, and 6th grade, but the7th grade changed. Overall it has been a wonderful and life changing experience for everyone.

Kate added that volunteers 18 and older are a very important part of the DI program and are needed in order to create a fair, competitive, and fun experience for every Destination Imagination team. Even the smallest Destination Imagination tournament needs over 100 officials to create a fair competitive field for the teams.
