If you are in need of a new car, this may be for you. Unveiled at the Grand Prix Formula 1 event in Monza,



Italy, the model is made of over one million Lego Technic pieces, down to its very engine: a block of over 2,300 Lego Power Function motors and over 4,000 Technic gear wheels that give the replica
