

Tony Carpenter **Imperial Flyers**

Frank Middleton introduces our quest speaker, Tony

Carpenter, Past President of the Wheat Ridge Optimist Club and Zone 6 Lt. Governor for the CO-WY District. Tony also serves as the fitness chair for the district.

This morning Tony talks about his involvement in the Imperial Flyers and his interests in the flying trapeze. He has been "flying" for the past 50 years.

At this point Tony strips down to his Trapeze Leotard outfit and pays homage to Jules Léotard, who was a French acrobatic performer and aerialist who developed the art of trapeze flying. He also popularized the one-piece gym wear that now bears his name and inspired the 1867 song "The Daring Young Man on the Flying Trapeze." When it was introduced, the trapeze also became revolutionize the circus as an act.

Tony shared that the city of Denver's involvement with the circus has a history as well, for example, on March 21, 1878, the American circus mogul Phineas T. Barnum bought 760 acres for just \$11,000, and a few years later, the Barnum subdivision was platted. Additionally, the University of Denver offered classes in trapeze starting back in 1913, which became a very popular program.

The flying trapeze made a move from the University of Denver gymnasium to the Denver Central YMCA gymnasium on 16th and Lincoln streets. It had a larger space, a much higher ceiling, and iron girders from which to hang the equipment, which was all suspended and then "flown" back into the ceiling of the gymnasium when out of use. When the flying trapeze moved, the single trapeze, double trapeze, and revolving ladder went along with it and were featured in YMCA's circuses. Bob Grav and Jimmy Kyle did the revolving ladder act, and Manny Crespin and Cheryl Cohan did the double trapeze act on the original equipment.


Alton Barber was the primary catcher in those days, and was also the head of DU's Speech Department at DU. Tony became a gymnast very early on and began to work

out at the YMCA when he there saw the trapeze set up and became very interested. He did this all through high school. Trapeze was thriving, and Tony discovered he was a natural and was soon practicing with the experts. He was even was hired by the Flying Lunas, and went on the road with them. For one magical year, he traveled with the circus. He

bliss. He retired and got a real job. Eventually, he went back to the YMCA and continue to train. Unfortunately after 70 years at the YMCA without an accident, one happened and the program was discontinued. Fortunately one member found some suitable property in Westminster and a trapeze rig was set up, and the Imperial Flyers were born. They currently have a full-size rig and can practice when weather allows. Ben Coleman built the rig and is still flying at the age of 88. The rig

is constructed of oil rig piping and might be the strongest rig in the world.

Tony said, when hitting the net injuries can happen. Also, the physical nature of flying can result in injuries. The world-wide web has introduced the club to the world.

Tony ended his presentation by saying, many of the trapeze rigs around the world can be traced back to the Imperial Flyers club. He said come out to their Open House in the summertime. May through September and fly weather permitting. The biggest thrill is climbing the ladder, 25 feet from the ground, and is the most difficult part many consider. The Imperial Flyers, an initially small gathering of friends and family, has over the years morphed into a free Circus, one-night only show.
