Greg also mentioned that the Union Pacific (UP) Big Boy steam locomotive 4000-class 4-8-8-4 is scheduled to be at the Golden Spike 150-year anniversary this May 10th in Helper, UT, and will be the first road trip for the Big Boy since it has been fully restored. As connecting track has been long torn out, the Big Boy will be closer to Ogden with the exact location to be announced through the UP Steam Club. Actual

The Big Boy is the largest steam locomotive put into regular service in the world. They were built between 1941 and 1944 with a total of 25 built for freight service between Cheyenne, Wyoming, and Ogden, UT. National History Day in Colorado Kayla Gabehart, Associate Director

Kayla Gabehart was our speaker to day was introduced by Karl Geil. Kayla is Associate Director for National History Day in Colorado. According to their website: "National History Day in Colorado is a social studies and literacy program that equips students in elementary, middle, and high school with the skills necessary to succeed in college and the real world. Students participate in a project-based learning curriculum that emphasizes critical reading and thinking, research, analysis, and the drawing of meaningful conclusions. Students can complete these projects in groups or as individuals in one of five cate-

gories: documentary, paper, exhibit, performance, or website. They then compete in one of our fifteen regions across the state in either the junior (middle school) or senior (high school) division, or in the elementary poster contest (4th and 5th graders). Regional winners compete at the State Contests in May on the University of Colorado Denver campus. First and second place state winners compete in Nationals at the University of Maryland, College Park in June.

National History Day in Colorado reaches nearly 23,000 students across the state each year. We also provide teacher trainings, research field trips, supply grants, classroom resources, scholarship opportunities for students, and graduate and continuing professional education courses for teachers."

Kayla was recruiting for judges for the Denver regional contest, which will be held May 4 on the campus of University of Colorado Denver. If interested you can volunteer on line at: https://clas.ucdenver.edu/nhdc/.

Kayla also showed a video presented by a middle school student winner from last year's contest, entitled "Radium Girls," which was truly fascinating and amazing research for a middle schooler. The Radium Girls were female factory workers who contracted radiation from painting watch dials with self-luminous paint. Painting was done by women at three different sites in the United States, and the term now applies to the women working at the facilities—the first, a United States Radium factory in Orange, New Jersey, beginning around 1917. The women in the facility had been told the paint was harmless, and

subsequently ingested deadly amounts of radium after being instructed to "point" their brushes on their lips in order to give them a fine point; some also painted their fingernails, face and teeth with the glowing substance. The women were instructed to point their brushes because using rags, or a water rinse, caused them to waste too much time and waste too much of the material made from powdered radium, gum arabic and water.

Five of the women in New Jersey challenged their employer in a case over the right of individual workers who contract occupational to sue their employers under New Jersey's occupational injuries law, which at the time had a two-year statute of limitations, but settled out of court in 1928. Five women in Illinois who were employees of the Radium Dial Company (which was unaffiliated with the United States Radium Corporation) sued their employer under Illinois law, winning damages in 1938.

Beware of Email Spoofing: Email spoofing is when the sender of an email, typically spam, forges (spoofs) the email header "From address" so the email being sent appears to have been sent from a legitimate email address that is not the senders own address. Recently some members have been receiving emails appearing to be coming from Jim Easton or Everett Gardner only to learn they are not from them. So, when you respond with not actually checking the associate email address you are responding to a spammer.

While there is no fool-proof way to prevent this type of abuse to your email inbox, but you could adopt some "best practices" when it comes to your email security:

- ♦ Change your password frequently.
- Always run full virus scans on your computer (at least once a week).
- Avoid including your email address in online blogs and posts. Try using (at) and (dot) com instead of @ and .com to prevent malicious automations from harvesting your address.
- Avoid using your primary email account for everything online. If you are signing up for something like a mailing

- list, contest, application form, or something similar, use a free throwaway email account like Gmail or Hotmail, something you don't mind deleting if it gets abused.
- Only use your primary email to communicate with people you know or trust.

So what can you do about email spoofing? The short answer is, not much. There are no definitive ways to prevent someone from harvesting your email address from the internet and using it for spam. Just be aware!
