Diane Martini Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Campus

Craig Eley introduced our speaker for today, Diane Martini, Marketing Director from the Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Community. The title of her presentation was "Are You Ready?".

Diane has spent 19 years working in the senior care industry. She wants to help make sure that people have are prepared for some difficult situations and decisions that may arise as they move into their eldercare years. Some of the questions that she asks seniors are:

- Have you shared your wishes with your children/loved ones?
- If needed, what type of care would you prefer?
- Have you shared your financial status with children?
- ♦ Is your estate in order?
- Oo you have your final arrangements in place?
- Do you have Powers of Attorney in place, both for medical and financial decisions?

Diane encourages people to share information with children and loved ones, since if they are not aware of your wishes and your financial status they may not know what type of care to seek out, what benefits or services are available to you, or how to cover the costs involved.

An eldercare attorney can work with you to establish a Power of Attorney, which will allow someone you designate to communicate with health care providers or other professionals. This could be critically important if difficult decisions need to be made in a timely manner. Another planning idea Diane mentioned was to pay for your final arrangements now, using today's

dollars. This will not only save on rising costs, but also allow you to make sure you have the type of service or remembrance you would prefer.

The number one reason people move into assisted living is memory loss. Number two is difficulties with mobility. As baby boomers become seniors, the current "Silver Tsunami" will put great strain on care facilities, caregivers, and state and federal services that try assist with what we likely be quickly rising prices.

Photo Noel Hasselgren The estimates are that there will be 16 million people with Alzheimer's by 2050, and memory care costs about \$5,700/month currently.

Some questions were asked about care benefits for veterans. Diane encouraged vets to investigate the benefits available since it is not always easy to get the right answers. She also mentioned that there can be long wait lists for VA facilities.

Diane brought up Long Term Care insurance, and how it can be a great resource for seniors to help cover expenses. There were questions asked about the costs, services covered and the health requirements necessary in order to get a Long-Term Care policy. There are several Monaco South club members who can assist with the answers to these questions, so consider asking around if you would like more details.

Diane is also very involved in the Colorado Senior Lobby. The Lobby works on getting important messages affecting seniors in front of our legislators. Please consider joining the lobby! Diane says all are welcome and they can always use more help.
