



## HOBY: Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership

President Everett Gardner speaks **Program** 

briefly about the HOBY and how EMPOWER • LEAD • EXCEL OCMS par-

ticipates in it every June before introducing our member and speaker, Paul Bernard. Paul is the CO-WY District HOBY Liaison and OCMS Chairman.

As Paul starts his program he says he is pleased and proud to announce that every June one of the best HOBY Conferences in the nation takes place in Colorado at the University of Denver

campus. For 3½ days over 200 student 15-16 year old, from every corner of Colorado assemble in 15-member teams to share ideas, attend leadership seminars, create team cheers and original slogans, meet new friends, and establish beginnings of lifelong relationships. This years event is scheduled from June 20<sup>th</sup> through June 23rd.

Paul showed a film clip that captured the flavor and excitement of the event. Students are taught about the duty and responsibility of leadership as to the new & unknown world opening up to them. The transition from student to adult is a critical element of their learning experience. The transformation from quiet curiosity to leadership and genuine goodwill one to another is remarkable. Each student is sponsored by their school or a support organization like the Optimists. The cost of attending the Conference is \$195 per student. Monaco South provides service and conversation on their last day, by engaging in a lively late afternoon picnic celebration with all the student teams. We are there to explain why Optimism should be the preferred philosophy to live by, and also to affirm they are all on a very exciting path. During the picnic teams gather in sitdown circles. An Optimist member joins in the conversation positively announcing, we are the adults concerned with their success and future. Q & A can be spirited and engaging. It is truly a life changing event for these young adults. They discover the magic of feeding off one another, sharing new ideas and the unlimited potential ahead of them. As an added reward, the quality and equity of their graduation certificate is an asset to college admission.

#### What is HOBY?

"Founded in 1958, HOBY's mission is to inspire and develop our global community of youth and volunteers to a life dedicated to leadership, service, and innovation.

HOBY programs are conducted annually throughout the United States, serving local and international high school

Due to the selfless efforts of volunteers and the contributions of generous donors, more than 10,000 students participate in HOBY programs annually.

#### **HOBY History**

In the summer of 1958, actor Hugh O'Brian received the

invitation that would change his life.

O'Brian, then 33, was in Winnipeg, Manitoba, parlaving his fame as television's legendary Wyatt Earp into extra income by guest-starring in a rodeo. Then the cable arrived from French Equatorial Africa:



renowned humanitarian and 1952 Nobel Peace Prize winner Dr. Albert Schweitzer would welcome him at any time.

O'Brian had long admired the German doctor-missionarytheologian-musician. "I'd read so much about him." he recalls. "He was a great humanitarian who could have done anything he wanted in the world, and there he was in the middle of Africa taking care of people." Within two weeks O'Brian was on his way, by commercial airliner, bush plane and canoe, to the famed hospital that Schweitzer had founded on the banks of the Ogooue River in Lambarene. The actor spent nine days at the clinic where Schweitzer and volunteer doctors and nurses, working without electricity, or running water, cared for patients, including many with lepro-

The doctor was impressed that the young American had taken the trouble to visit him. He shared stories and life lessons with O'Brian each evening. Schweitzer, then 83, was concerned about global peace prospects and was convinced that the United States should take a leadership role in achieving peace. He impressed upon the young O'Brian the urgency for change and how education must teach young people to think for themselves. It was an unforgettable nine days. And, as O'Brian departed, Schweitzer took his hand and asked, "Hugh, what are you going to do with this?" Two weeks after returning from his 1958 meeting with Schweitzer, O'Brian put together a prototype seminar for young leaders — HOBY. And the rest is living history.
