Robert 1954; <u>Jackie Robinson and Bob</u> Feller elected to Baseball Hall of Fame, 1962; and <u>George Foreman KO's</u> Ron Lyle, 1976. Lyle had a total of 51 fights, 7 losses, 31 wins by KO's and 43 wins. He died in Denver on November 26, 2011.

Robert Victor Hugo, 93, died December 20,2019. Born August 5,1926, he graduated from the University of Denver. He worked as an electrical engineer for Public Service Company of Colorado and was the co-owner of the Wayne Case Orchestra as well as being one of the original members of the John Philip Sousa Concert Band. A veteran of the Second World War, he served in Special Services. He was a former Governor of the Colorado/Wyoming District of Optimist International and Past President of the Optimist Club of Monaco South.

Krista Kafer Women's Development Association

<u>Krista Kafer</u> is many things: World traveler, Denver Post editorial page columnist, radio personality, beekeeper. Ah, beekeeper! She has this in common with one of our own beekeeper, **Craig Eley**, who gave her name to **Paul Bernard** as a potential speaker.

Krista did not talk about beekeeping? She opened her conversation by stating that she has been to over 40 countries; like India, South Africa, Nepal, and Egypt, and that many of them have deplorable living conditions, but none that she would describe as "grim."

On the other hand, Krista says, Lahore, Pakistan is a truly "grim" place. Lahore, the capital of the Pakistani province of Punjab, is a city which is one of the most polluted in the world, where the 98% Muslim population lives in total squalor with open sewage canals, severe air pollution, and almost no joy. The plight of women in Pakistan is desperate or, as Krista describes it "unenviable." Fewer than 45% of women can read and write and they receive minimal public education.

When Krista visited Pakistan, she found that because of their lack of education, most women work as domestics; few were able to obtain positions where they could make enough to make working worthwhile. Because of the highly patriarchal based society, women are looked upon, for the most part, as inferior to men.

Krista explained that one of the few organizations looking to improve the quality of life for women in Pakistan is the <u>Women's Development Association</u>. "For more than 17 years, Women's Development Association has devoted its energy to passionately advocating

for the illiterate, needy, and politically under represented members of our global family." The Women's Development Association states in its mission, "Since its inception in 2000, the WDA has provided basic literacy, math, and skills training to women living in the slums of Lahore. This all began with a group of 20 women and through God's guidance, fiscal responsibility, hard work, and determination. The WDA has not only managed to change the lives of 5,240 women through education and

skills training, but also had the opportunity to share the love of Christ. These women are now self-sufficient and have changed the repetitive cycle from being a victim to being a leader! In 2008 the WDA also instituted a primary education program and have provided 300 children with the basic human rights of education."

Lead by Josna Azim, one of the organizations founders, and Kristen Johnson, U.S. President of the WDA, the organization continues to work for the opportunities of advancing themselves through education of Pakistani women.

Krista stated that she is a member of the Board of Directors of WDA and the fund-raising headquarters is here in Denver Colorado. She said that to fully train a class of twenty women in Pakistan it costs \$1,320 and that they fund the organization through various small organizations, mostly churches, by participating in "alternative gift markets."

Thanks to Krista for sharing her experiences with us and for her insight into the plight of women in Pakistan.

In a related article found while writing this article, "According to Thomson Reuters Foundation, Pakistan is ranked 6th most unsafe country for women. Human Rights Watch report has highlighted how every year 1100 women

are killed in the name of honour in Pakistan. In addition to this, in the last couple of years, dozens of women have been killed in the name of honour but were declared as suicide cases and thousands of gender based domestic violence cases went unreported."
