# Building Violins Bill Morgan

Today's speaker was introduced by **Randy Marcove**. Randy recently learned a bit about an amazing art being

practiced by one of our own members, **Bill Morgan**. So, Randy encouraged Bill to share his passion with the club.

Bill is a violin maker, and in the past taught a 16-week, 4-hour course on building violins at Red Rocks Community College.

Bill began playing the violin at age 5, trying to keep up with his sister, who started at age 4. By high school the vio-

lin began to "phase out" of Bill's life. Later, in his adult working career, Bill needed a stress reliever. He decided to start playing the violin again and looked around for a used one. He bought one and then realized it needed a great deal of work, so decided to learn how to fix it. This then led him to start building violins from scratch himself.

Bill says 120-180 hours of labor goes into making a violin, which translates to about six months of calendar time, allowing for material collection and glue drying. The classes Bill taught included carving, wood selection, lining of the ribs, cutting f-holes, wood bending, sound posts physics, and varnishing. Maple wood is used, and the wood is then cut for with the grain to run straight before carving. Bill hands carves but there are also tools that handle it today.

Varnish or lack of varnish affect the sound of the instru-

ment. Violins are usually sound tested before any varnish is applied. Violin makers need flexible varnish that can be removed if necessary during tuning.

Bill did make a few violins on commission, but it is not a lucrative venture. By charging \$2,500, he feels he earned about \$4/hour.

Bill passed around examples of different phases of construction, and took some questions, including: "What makes





a Stradivarius a Stradivarius?" The originals and true Stradivarius were made by Antonio Stradivari, and were in the baroque style. That style does not fit the modern orchestras, so there are no real Stradivarius made today.

"Is it true that a violin must be played regularly to keep it tip top?" That is a myth, per Bill, yet it is a myth that many experts in Italy continue to keep alive. "What is the difference between a fiddle and a violin?" None! So, these two

violin players are basically playing the same type of instrument.

Many thanks Bill, we all learned something today, which makes it a great day!
