

Results from the informal survey on holding in-person MSOC meetings at the restaurant that **Tom Glazier** checked out are in. There were 27 "Yes" votes; 35 "No" votes; and one "Neutral". The votes came from the majority of members who were regular attendees at pre-COVID-19 MSOC meetings. At least six of the "Yes" votes expressed concern about the cost of the meal. Tom Glazier asked for several MSOC members to go to the restaurant and check it out.

<u>Scott Henke</u>, a former Monaco South member, and owner of <u>Onsite Consulting</u> made a highly informative presentation on computer security and safety. Many questions were asked by members and answered by Scott. Since the Q & A's extended beyond 9 a.m., it was decided that members should send me an email with additional questions that I will consolidate and send to Scott to be answered at a future Zoom meeting. After the meeting, Scott sent me a coupon to be used by any MSOC member that is good for a free PC Diagnostics and Tune-up. The coupon is attached to the GUMS distribution email. Also attached to the GUMS email is a document with "helpful hints" that Scott used during his presentation. To show our appreciation for Scott's presentation, we made him a <u>"Friend of Optimism."</u>

Staying Safe Online Scott Henke

Our guest speaker today was Scott Henke owner of On-site Consulting, and a former member of the Monaco



South Optimist Club. Scott specializes in maintenance, repairs, and consulting, since 1982. He talked today about how an ounce of preventive care can avoid a pound of repair for your computer and software. He also a "Staying Safe Online" handout, to access Click Here.

Scott recommends that you have two piec-

es of software installed on your computer to help keep it running efficiently. That software is a good antivirus and a good backup program. He recommends ESET and Carbonite respectively for these purposes. The ESET program can provide protection against viruses but also

against hackers, protects passwords and other personal information, and allows Onsite to monitor your computer. Carbonite will do automatic backups of all your software and data files in the cloud so that it is completely unconnected to your computer. The cloud is a virtual entity that is made up of other computers on the internet.

Scott also recommends keeping your computer software updated. Several software packages will periodically issue updates to fix vulnerabilities in the applications or add additional features. Some are automatic updates while others are optional. Updates can contain bugs which cause problems with the operation of the software, so Scott recommends only the automatic updates.

Finally, Scott recommends that your computer has a tune -up at least once a year and is replaced or at least the hard drive replaced every five to seven years. As your computer reads and re-writes files to your hard drive, they become fragmented over time. The tune-up is a through reorganization of the files on the hard drive, defragmenting the files and cleaning old pieces of information off of the drive. It

Have I Been Pwned

During Scott Henke's presentation, he mentioned this website, https://haveibeenpwned.com/, it allows Internet users to check whether their personal data has been compro-



mised by data breaches. The service collects and analyzes hundreds of database dumps and pastes containing information about billions of leaked accounts, and allows users to search

for their own information by entering their username or email address. Users can also sign up to be notified if their email address appears in future dumps.

keeps the computer operating efficiently, increasing the speed that it retrieves information. Onsite Consulting also checks for uninstalled software updates. Onsite can perform tune-ups at a low cost and Scott has MSOC members a free diagnostic and tune up, see the GUMS distribution email.

Scott then talked a bit about scams. There are unsavory characters on the internet that are constantly trying to get you the send them money or personal information so that they can steal your identity or worse. Things you need to know is that the IRS, Microsoft, Apple, a bank or legitimate financial service will NOT ASK for your personal information over the internet. No, you most likely did not win a lottery or drawing that you did not enter and no you should not hold very large sums of money from foreign countries for a while for a share of the fortune. Scams can come via phone calls or email. Treat all communications from strangers and most unexpected communications from people you know with skepticism. Remember the old adage, "If it seems too good to be true, it probably is."


Hover over links in emails to see the full address of the link and make sure it is not sending you somewhere other than where you want to go. If you are confused, contact them yourself rather than going through a link. Legitimate companies doing business on the internet will not ask for payment using gift cards. When you are doing business over the internet, be sure you are aware of who they will share your information and opt-out of sharing that information when possible.
