Fuji; 1498, On his third voyage to the New World, Christopher Columbus discovers Trinidad; 1620, Pilgrims leave England on their way to America; 1703, Author Daniel Defoe is placed in a pillory for the crime of seditious libel after publishing a politically satirical pamphlet ... and is pelted with flowers; 1777, 19-year old Marguis de Lafayette is made a Major General in the Continental Army; 1865, First narrowgauge mainline railway in the world opens in Grandchester, Australia; 1876, US Coast Guard Officers' Training School is established in New Bedford, MA; 1954, Milwaukee first baseman Joe Adcock becomes the third player in the 20th century to hit four home runs in a 9-inning game ...
