Note from Craig Eley

"Thank you for the "Get Well Cards!" They were lying on a table in my hospital room this past Friday, dropped off by an anonymous Optimist brother while I was apparently taking a nap. I learned later that it was **Michael Chavez**. A nice surprise on what turned out to be my last day at Sky Ridge Medical Center.

My journey to Sky Ridge began at the beginning of May, when, as a result of there being blood in my urine, I was diagnosed with bladder cancer, kidney cancer, and lung cancer. None of these had given me pain or any other symptoms. I underwent a series of tests, scans, and a biopsy, all through the Kaiser system. During May and June, my bladder was scraped twice to remove the cancer. That was successful, but now I need to undergo weekly bladder therapy for 6 weeks (in which tuberculosis bacillus is inserted into the bladder for a two-hour stint) followed by quarterly "surveillance" for two years.

On July 1st the lower lobe of my right lung was removed at Sky Ridge through the use of a robot directed by a lung surgeon. This allowed very small instruments to be inserted to take out the piece of lung, stitch it up, and remove lymph nodes for analysis. Instead of the removal of a rib for access, all I have are five scars about the size of a fingernail and one about 3 inches long. I had an earlier PET scan which showed the cancer confined to the lower right lung, so this operation should be the end of the lung cancer.

Although the surgeon stated that the operation had gone perfectly, I remained five days in Sky Ridge while my blood pressure was acting up. Now I have been released, with the only follow-up care being that I have to inject myself with blood thinner each day until the end of June. Recover from

the surgery (I have a little pain on my right side) is expected to take four weeks.

Sometime in August, I will probably have the cancerous kidney removed. This will be accomplished laparoscopically, so will be minimally invasive with quick recovery time. Assuming no complications, that should end my summer medical adventures. I am scheduled to return to work the beginning of September.

I have been blessed to have had an army of friends, including from Monaco South, to give me encouragement and good wishes during this interesting time. Having a support group makes all the difference – thank you all very much!"

Harry is our club's version of Phileas Fogg, having recently gone around the world in 115 days. Harry and Linda's trip on Holland America's Amsterdam ship covered 77 countries. The trip began with 1,300 passengers, and over 1,000 did the whole round the world voyage. Harry and Linda were some of the few first-timers, and there were many people who go annually, and the boat has in effect become their beach house for some people.

Harry and Linda were in a subgroup of 47 traveling with Road Scholars, so they had their own lectures on sites and subjects the day prior to visiting the location. One of the more fascinating stops for Harry were the Mumbai slums and meeting people who lived there, even while working in the more modern and developed part of the city. Harry took questions from the crowd on the ship and its engines, the food, the wine, the rough seas, and the service. 

Declaration of Independence Facts/Trivia

The final draft of the Declaration was approved by the Continental Congress on July 4th, although the date of its signing has long been disputed. Most historians have concluded that it was signed on August 2, 1776, nearly a month after its adoption, and not on July 4 as is commonly believed.

The signing of the United States Declaration of Independence occurred primarily on August 2, 1776 at the Pennsylvania State House, Independence Hall in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The 56 delegates to the Second Continental Congress represented the 13 former colonies which had



declared themselves the "United States of America," and they endorsed the Declaration of Independence which the Congress had approved on July 4, 1776. The Declaration proclaimed that the former Thirteen Colonies then at war with Great Britain were now a sovereign, independent nation and thus no longer a part of the British Empire. The signers' names are grouped by state, with the exception of President of the Continental Congress John Hancock; the states are arranged geographically from south to north, with Button Gwinnett from Georgia first, and Matthew Thornton from New Hampshire last.

Nine Things You Probably Did not Know About the Fourth of July

Check out these facts you might not have known about the holiday.

- Congress did not actually vote for independence on July 4.** Twelve of thirteen states approved a resolution for independence on July 2, not July 4, when the declaration was actually adopted. New York did not vote until July 9. Many of the signers did not attach their names to the document until August 2.
- The Fourth of July did not become an official holiday until over a century after America declared its independence.** Though early celebrations began the following year, the Fourth of July wasn't designated a federal holiday until 1870. In 1941, it became a paid holiday for federal employees.
- During the Revolutionary War, George Washington gave his soldiers a special treat for the holiday.** On July 4, 1778, George Washington ordered a double ration of rum for his soldiers. He also ordered a cannon salute to celebrate the occasion.
- In a bizarre coincidence, Thomas Jefferson, and John Adams both died on July 4, 1826 — the nation's 50th birthday.**
- Calvin Coolidge is the only president to be born on July 4.**
- The United States is not the only country to celebrate independence on July 4.** The Philippines gained its independence from U.S. colonial control on July 4, 1946, and the day became a national holiday.
- Celebrating with fireworks is as old as the holiday itself.** At the first Fourth of July celebrations, which took place in Philadelphia in 1777, revelers fired a cannon 13 times, once for each colony. That night, 13 fireworks were fired off from the city's commons.
- Today, fireworks are a massive industry.** According to the American Pyrotechnics Association, Americans spent over \$1 billion on fireworks in 2017. That number has roughly tripled over the last 20 years.
- July 4 is the biggest hot dog day of the year.** Americans consume roughly 150 million hot dogs on the Fourth of July — enough to stretch from Washington, D.C. to Los Angeles five times.
