This past week we learned the passing of **John Oss**. His son <u>Eric Oss</u> wrote,

"This is John and Ruth's son Eric. I just wanted to acknowledge the email and confirm Dad's passing. As you know he was undergoing treatment for acute myloid leukemia. A few days ago Dad called



me late at night reporting that was having stomach pain, he thought due to mixing up medications. After a number of tests in the ER it was determined that the pain was due to constipation, but that his liver and kidney function was also suffering. We checked him in for the night for observation and treatment for constipation and pain. The following night I got a call from Dad saying that he was very uncomfortable and had asked that hospice be contacted. We started that process, organized a family zoom meeting to bring all the brothers up to speed with Dad alternating between participating and nodding off. He let us all know that he was ready to move on and that he loved us all and was happy with the life he had led. I took Mom home to get some rest hoping to move Dad home in the morning, and within an hour he had passed away.

Mom and Dad agree that, "this isn't the end," and that they will see each other in heaven. All of the sons will be in town this evening to support Mom, and to make arrangements. We will make sure to communicate those plans out to all of you. Thank you for your friendship and love of my parents.

As a Major in the Air Force John served as Manager of the Titan Rocket Launch Program at Vandenberg in California. After the service he worked in research and development of solid rocket boosters for Martin Marrieta. He is survived by his wife Ruth; five sons, Mark (Evelyn), Carl (Cheryl), Eric (Carrie), Ivan (Deirdre) and Hans; 14 grandchildren, one great grandchild and innumerable friends!

# Greg Hurd A Hurd of Trains

Greg Hurd gives a presentation this morning dedicated to John Oss. Greg shows us a picture of his basement featuring his train collection. Amazing does not begin to describe the collection. It includes a 22" long locomotive that has pulled as many as 22 cars. The layout is designed to simulate a trip from Denver to Laramie, including a stop in Estes Park. Many pieces Greg built from scratch using the various product he has available. The collection features a mountain with a tunnel, along with incredible detail, which Greg built that took many hours to build. Another portion shows the train station in Baden-Baden, located in Germany, which Greg built from pictures he took in the 80's when he worked there. The train system has been computerized which allows them to run 5 different lines at the same time. Some of the early models were made in the 1920s, '30s and '40s.
