#### Jason Ganahl Maestro of Meat, GQue Championship BBQ

Our speaker today, <u>Jason Ganahl</u>, was introduced by **Frank Middleton**. Jason is the owner of <u>GQue BBQ Res-</u> <u>taurant</u> in Westminster (5160 W. 120<sup>th</sup> Avenue), and aspires to create the best tasting barbecue you have ever tasted. Jason's secrets to attaining this goal are:

- Hundreds of hours cooking and recipe refining
- Finest quality meats (Prime Cuts)
- Best Seasoning
- Freshest Ingredients

Jason started as a judge of barbecue competitions and carefully studied the techniques of the top contenders across the U.S. He now is one of the experts on this art. In addition to his restaurant in Westminster, he frequently teaches classes and gives lectures to various groups.

After participating on the competition circuit for many years, and winning some of the most prestigious awards, including Rocky Mountain Association Team of the Year and finishing in the top 1% nationally in all five categories, Jason's team was declared to be one of the top 29 teams in the U.S.

Jason decided to limit his travel and spend more time with his family and opened GQue Restaurant in 2014. It was declared "one of the hottest new restaurants in Denver" by *Zagat: National Restaurant Reviews* in 2015, and *Westword: One of the best BBQ joints in Denver, 2016,* and has maintained the quality of a "5-star restaurant." Jason also does a booming catering business in the Denver Metro area and teaches regular classes at his Westminster location.

Jason is currently looking for a new location, hopefully in the southeast metro area since, according to Jason there are no "star quality" barbecue places in this area.

As Jason explained, there is a difference between "barbecuing" and "grilling," although most people use the words interchangeably. Grilling has to do with high heat (over 400 degrees), usually with "thin" cuts of meat (steaks, hamburgers, hot dogs); whereas barbecuing has to do with

low and slow cooking with bigger pieces of meat (pork butts, brisket, chicken, ribs).

To get the best results from your grill, Jason suggests keeping the grate very, very clean (grill marks are not a mark of a good steak): Cook at a high temperature of at least 400 degrees. While gas grills can produce a good meal, most cannot get to a hot enough temperature to get a good char on a steak.

And the secret to the best BBQ is an even cooking temperature of about 225 degrees for 5 to 6 hours. The use

of a wood like Cherry and Hickory wood, are the best. Mesquite usually overpowers the taste of the meat. Again clean the grate, oil grate with cooking oil and keep the meat moisturized.

Get yourself a good "instant read' meat thermometer. Do not trust built-in thermometer on your grill. They tell you the temperature of the grill, not the meat. Buy the best cuts of meat you can afford (prime cuts are best). Limit sauce. Sauce masks the taste of the meat.
