Anchor Center for Blind Children Frances Owens, Community Relations Manager

President **Jim Easton** called on **Steve Kady**, who in turn, called on **Tom Hoch** who then introduced Colorado's former first lady, <u>Frances Owens</u> as our guest speaker this morning. Frances is the Community Relations Manager for the Anchor Center for Blind Children.

Frances, started off by saying "... after working every day with 35 women and only one man, it is nice to have breakfast with a room full of men." With that she has every ones attention.

The Anchor Center for Blind Children works with blind children between birth and 5 years of age. They tackle the unique problems that blind children face in learning without the advantage of eyesight. Even learning to eat is quite difficult for a blind child. The teachers are not ordinary teachers. They have been specially trained to work with these children and their families. That is right, even the families have to learn how to interact with their blind child. The Center gets 97 percent of its funding from private sources so they are constantly fundraising and many of the people working for the Center are under paid or not paid—volunteers.

The Center's state of the art building—the Julie McAndrews Mork Building—was specially designed for the education of visually impaired children. The building is located at 2550 Roslyn Street in northeast Denver. You can get an idea about the uniqueness of the building by viewing the video on this webpage, CLICK HERE. The Design elements focus on light with textures and sounds that encourage develop-

ment. And all classrooms are acoustically engineered to minimize noise and support sound cues. Overall the building gives children a sense of security in their ability to navigate the world.

The Anchor Center currently work with nearly 200 children each year. They integrate sensory stimulation for the child's learning experiences. This translates into happier children and happier families. Most of these children will graduate and success-

fully integrate into the public-school system. Some have gone on the successful careers in music and law. The Anchor Center also has outreach programs throughout the state of Colorado to put teachers in the homes of children who cannot travel to Denver.

Thank you Frances for sharing this insight and making us more aware of how we can serve as *Friends of Youth* in this spectrum of our society.
