The food and lectures are very good and there are a lot of nice people on the ship. We are considered newbees as this is our first trip around the world on ship. There are only about 100 of us out of 1300 that are newbees. Many, many passengers have been on this ship for over 5 such trips. It just goes to prove that there is always someone that is doing more than one and there are many that are doing less. That is life.

Linda William AmeriCorps, A Little Help—helping older adults

Bob Meyer welcomes our speaker today, <u>Linda</u> <u>Williams</u> from the Tamarac Club. In October, Linda joined <u>AmeriCorps</u> a voluntary civil society program supported by the U.S. federal government, foundations, corporations, and other donors engaging adults in public service work with a goal of "helping others and meeting critical needs in the community." In that role she became involved with "<u>A Little Help."</u> A Little Help is a nonprofit community organization that connects neighbors across ages to enhance lives and strengthen our communities.

Linda asks, "How many of you, know your neighbors? Very well? Or at all? Not everyone's hand went up. She goes on and says, "As our society changes, we have changed, as did our communities and the familiarity with our neighbors has also changed.

A Little Help started in Washington Park, and focuses on trying to help older adults stay in their homes rather than go to nursing home. The organization began in 2005, and in 2011 they hired Dr. Paul Leon Ramsey as its first Director. Today the organization is serving Denver, Jefferson, Larimer, and Delta counties. The organization is trying to build community, and neighbors. Today 87% of older Adults want to stay in their home, and this group helps them do that. The video shows—Click Here—a wonderful interaction between the older residents and the younger volunteers who are getting to know each other.

"Service day" is the day when volunteers go to help clean windows, clean out gutters, etc. The major request is for transportation (dentist appointments, etc.). Linda tells about a resident of a nursing home who wants to get outside, and

she takes them on a ride for an hour. Some residents need help taking care of plants around the house. Handy work, they sometimes need help with changing of batteries, or a door knob, they also want to be able to help with these requests. Respite for care givers, sometimes care givers need a break and they try to provide this. Linda went to a home, and she read emails to a man, while his wife was able to get a break, while she knew, he was being helped. During the winter snow shoveling help is always needed.

A Little Help prefers to do things that are intergenerational, using youngsters to help is very helpful.

As the population ages, the need for these type of services will increase. Plenty of opportunities exist for the chance to help. Linda is sending around a signup sheets for a chance to signup to either provide services, or to volunteer, to receive the newsletter, or other opportunities for her to speak to other groups. For people who ask for services, it is not free. On the application, there is a need for both, services to be performed and for the chance to help. **Bob Avery** suggested contacting local Scouts that could assist. A Baseball Quote

"I can't hit when I need to." — Mickey Mantle
Editor's Note: On this date in 1969, Mr. Mantle
explained the reason behind his retirement from
baseball. Mantle made his debut at Yankee Stadium
at the tender age of 19. Up and down between AAA
and the big club that year, he hit .267 with 13 HR and
65 RBI. In Game 2 of the World Series that year, he

was playing right field next to the legendary Joe DiMaggio, who was playing his last season.

Manager Casey Stengel told Mantle before the game to cover right-center, since the aging DiMaggio had lost a step. Willie Mays hit a fly ball to right-center, and Mantle took off after it ... noticed that DiMaggio was calling for it, and pulled up ("because you don't want to run into Joe DiMaggio," said the teenager after the game), planted his right foot ... in a drain, and went down. He was carried off the field ... and the knee would never be the same. Between that and his legendary drinking, his career stats were likely somewhat below what they could have been.

Nonetheless ... In his 18 Major League seasons, all with the Yankees, he compiled a .298 BA, .421 OBP (helped by 1,733 walks), 536 HR, 1,509 RBI, and 153 SB. Mantle was an All Star 16 seasons and MVP 3 seasons. In 1960 and 1961 he finished 2nd in MVP voting behind teammate Roger Maris, who hit a combined 100 HR in those two years. In his career Mantle got 2,415 hits, in 2,401 games played.
