## A Blast from the Past By Pat Bush, GUMS Editor, February 21, 2020

I was writing this newsletter last Saturday morning, won-



dering how to fill the space normally reserved for our guest speaker. It is always a challenge to fill this space on camaraderie day. Then I started reminiscing back to when I was the president of Monaco South in 1983-'84. So, I decided to put some of those thoughts into this newsletter. They

might trigger the memories of some of the longtime members and give newer members a glimpse into the early days of Monaco South.

To put the time into context, there were no personal computers in households and no social media around. You either had to pay for a long-distance phone call or send a letter via the postal service to communicate with relatives and friends across the nation. There was no satellite TV or streaming services: no Netflex, or Amazon Prime, or Hulu or YouTube. Cable TV was just starting at that time with the big thing being MTV. The GUMS newsletter was published each week, but not like it is today. The newsletter was typewritten, mimeographed, and mailed to members every week. There were no pictures in **GUMS**.

The membership meetings were held at the "Bob's/Azar's Big Boy" restaurant on Hampden Avenue. It is now the "New York Deli." Our membership numbers hovered around 58 members. The Christmas Tree Lot was our big fundraiser even back then. The lot first started when Joe Marci, Frank Middleton, Russ Paul, and I were members of the Southeast Denver Jaycees. Back in 1978, Joe and Frank brought the tree lot with them to the Monaco South Optimist Club when they became too old (35-year age limit) to be members in the Jaycees. Russ Paul and I joined Monaco South shortly after that.

The tree lot location bounced around guite a bit in the early days but found a home at the K-Mart parking lot by the time that Monaco South started running it. It remained there for the next thirty years or so while building a loyal following of customers. The Super Citizen program was established by the time I became President of Monaco South. We were in three schools at that time, including Samuels, Southmoor, and Holm. Charlie Korsoski was the project chairman. The marquee project during my presidential year was building baseball fields for the Arapahoe Little League. I had read an article in the Sentinel newspaper about how the Arapahoe Little League had an agreement with the City of Aurora to

lease a piece of property on the southeast corner of Buckley and Kentucky for 99 years at \$1.00 per year. However, they had to show significant progress in building the ballfield complex by an established deadline. As the deadline approached, they only had the grading done, which was not enough to show significant progress, so they were in danger of losing the lease.

I called **Mike Miller**, the President of the Arapahoe Little League at the time, to see if Monaco South could help them. Mike explained their biggest problem was getting the parents to volunteer to work on the fields. We thought if Monaco South members could provide the manpower the get the first two fields started, then Little League parents would be more willing to work on the project because they could see that it was more than just a pipe dream. That summer, we installed the irrigation systems, sod, and backstops for the first two fields. They even started to play games on the two fields. The parents then started to work on the complex and. over the next few years, finish two more fields, installed home run fencing, put in the parking lot, put in a concession/ restroom building, and equipment storage shed. Mike Miller joined Monaco South shortly after his presidential term ended with the Little League. He has been an active member of Monaco South for over 35 years. A couple of small social events during that year were the Monaco South Regatta and Little Tikes Camping and Fishing Expedition. The regatta was an event where we floated on inner tubes down the Highline Canal. The Little Tikes Expedition was taking our kids to the mountains to camp and fish for a weekend.

The Thanksgiving Dinner at the Boy and Girls Club did not exist during my Presidential term but was started a few years later by Bill Walters, who was in the catering business at the time, when he enlisted the club's help to serve the dinner he provided to hundreds of under privileged kids at the Boys and Girls Club.

Monaco South has a glorious history of volunteerism in the community, and I am proud to have been a small part of that. I would like to hear some of the stories of other members in the future edition of **GUMS**.
