Colorado Law Enforcement Memorial: Steve

regard to the Colorado Law Enforcement Memorial improvements. The memorial, at 15055 South Golden Road, in Golden, was started in 1978 and the first memorial ceremony was held in May of 1979. The Memorial is the official State of Colorado Memorial dedi-

cated to law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty. As of this coming May, 306 names will have



been added to this wall. Through its members, MSOC donated \$300 to this improvement effort and we will be recognized by the placement of this "Respect for Law" stone. The Memorial remodel dedication will be

on April 21, 2017 and the annual ceremony to honor fallen officers will be held on Friday, May 5, 2017.

National History Day in Colorado

Karl Geil introduced our guest speakers this morning. They are Celeste Archer and Sergio Portesan with National History Day in Colorado.

National History Day is a national competition for students in the 6th through 12th grades and has two divisions. The Junior Division is for 6th to 8th grade students while the Senior Division is for high school students.

Each year a theme is chosen and all projects entered into the competition must relate to that theme. The theme this year is "Taking a Stand in

History." Students may enter in one of nine categories including documentaries, performances, websites, or exhibits done by individuals or groups or a paper by an individual only. Groups can be up to five members. All work on a project must be original and developed for the project during the contest year.

The competition helps students learn history about an event of their choosing. That event may have local, regional, national or world influence. The projects are MSOC t-shirt. Celeste Archer was presented

limited to a specific size. The competition also teaches students organization, presentation, and interview skills. The Colorado competition starts with participation in one of 14 regional events. Qualifying projects advance to the State competition. The state competition will be held on Saturday, May 6th at the University of Colorado, Denver Campus. Of course, events like this would not exist without volunteer judges. They still need 40 additional volunteers to judge at the State competition. You do not have to be a historian to judge in the event; in fact, they prefer non-historians.

You can sign up to judge on the National History Day in Colorado website or by contacting Celeste or Sergio. As a side: we learned that our own Hamilton Middle School now requires all students to participate in National History Day and they had to have their own school competition to narrow the projects down to about 35 that could go on to the Denver Public School Regional Competition.
