Statement on Political Speakers and Candidates and Political Correctness

Kendra Black Denver City Councilwoman, District 4

Tom Mauro introduces our speaker this morning; Councilwoman <u>Kendra Black</u>, who represents the southeast part of Denver. Kendra starts by telling us how much she likes to come to our meetings.

She then proceeds to provide a brief update on what is happening city wide. She reports that the current population in the metro area is nearing 3 million, which has doubled since 1990. Over 250,000 per day drive into Denver to work, most of them in cars, with only the driver. The housing shortage is the norm, many people are looking for affordable places to live. But with single family homes renting at

\$2500-\$3000 per month many cannot afford the cost. There are many cases of people living with family members. Therefore, the priorities for the year include mobility, homelessness, lodgers tax for those utilizing Airbnb, an online short-term rental website, at the top of the list. Another concern is the need for sidewalk installations and/or improvements. She reported that southeast Denver has one of the lowest ridership rates for Light Rail and that marijuana retail outlets are being limited due to the proliferation of these outlets.

She also reported that Initiative 300 was passed, which allows for people to consume marijuana in some places. As an examples, an art gallery that wanted to allow it in an outdoor location available for consumption during an exhibit.

The City will be putting a bond on the November 2017 ballot. This bond will not increase our taxes, but will extend the taxes we already pay from the 2007 bond. The District 4

She also said, people want to see more restaurants, a beer garden from what she gathered from a survey this past fall. Plus, streetscapes (landscaping along the sidewalks) along with art projects. She now has established several citizen Work Groups, to address specific wants/needs.

It's exciting to have the public engaged and working towards the improvement of our community. South by Southeast will be featured this summer for a fun day! The event will include music, arts, and entertainment.

Kendra also talked about a Senior Series to get seniors engaged and active. An example she discussed was, "How to participate with social media, transportation, and the like."

In summary, Southeast Denver has some of the best neighborhood, great schools, and unfortunately some very poor commercial development areas. Planning and how this impacts our community are some of the things we need to address and how they impact our area. For an example she mentioned the K-Mart property, at Evans and Monaco, an area of blight, people spray paint, and unfortunately, no plans are on the books for this area.

Further, she mentioned that the city has initiated a health study, and if an area has been designated blight, it can affect the value of the property.
