Boone Pickens; 1942, Ted Kaczynski; 1943, Tommy John, not the underwear guy, but retried pro baseball pitcher; 1982, Olympian speed skater, Apolo Anton Ohno; and 1987, Serbian tennis player, Novak Djokovic.

Major Events on this date: First Life insurance policy in North America issued in Philadelphia, 1761; First wagon train departs Independence, MO for Oregon, 1843; Abraham Lincoln receives a patent for a device to lift a boat over shoals and obstructions, 1849; General Ulysses S. Grant begins the siege of Vicksburg, 1863; Toothpaste tube is invented, 1892; Wright Brothers receive a patent for the "flying machine," 1906; The "Bob Hope Show" last airs on NBC-TV, 1956; Mickey Mantle hits a ball off Yankee Stadium's façade, 1963; President Richard Nixon confesses his role in the Watergate cover-up, 1973; and Johnny Carson's final appearance as host of "The Tonight Show," 1992.

From the Prez

Prez Bob reported that 9 members of the Board of Direc-

tors participated in Thursday night's Board Meeting and they approved an increase dollar amount for the Sullivan Scholarship from \$6,000 to \$9,000, allowing the club to present 9 scholarships, rather than the previously approved 6. There were 13 candidates, all with excellent credentials, including twin sisters. It was suggested that we invite the 9 winners to participate in a Friday morning Zoom session, to introduce themselves. Joe Marci said he would check on this.

President Bob shared that the <u>Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham American Legion</u>, Post 1 could not accommodate the social isolation requirements currently in force in Denver, thus we will continue to meet using Zoom. He also said that we have members who, for whatever reason, do not have the capabilities to participate online and that we should continue to communicate with them using media with which they are familiar, such as the telephone, notes, or even a personal visit—of course with permission.

Did You Know?

Since this is Memorial Day Weekend, are you aware of the history of the Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham American Le-

gion, Post 1? Well, on March 20, 1919 (just three days after the adjournment of the Legion founding caucus in Paris, France) a group of Denver Veterans organized the Leo Leyden Post of World War I



Veterans to honor the first Colorado hero to pay the "supreme sacrifice." This group became the first Legion Post in Colorado and the fifteenth to be chartered in the United States. The charter is dated June 17, 1919 and was signed by thirty members. This charter now hangs in the Post Commander's office. See more Click Here.

- 4. Paste the link to the box, i.e., right-click your mouse and choose "Paste"
- 5. Choose "Next"
- 6. Name the shortcut something like "Monaco South Friday Zoom Meeting"
- 7. Choose "Finish"
- 8. Double-click on the shortcut when you want to join the Friday morning meeting If you need help doing this, please call me.

CO-WY District Update: As reported in the past few **GUMS** editions, both the CO-WY District and the Optimist International annual conventions have been canceled.
