Michael Chavez introduced Mitch Jelniker, Corporate Relations Manager at Food Bank of the Rockies (FBR), and our other guests who joined us. Paul Fisher, culinary manager and head chef at the Food Bank; Steve Martinez, Director Johnson Boys and Girls Club; and Charleen Ramirez, Director of Programs, Girls Inc.

After the introductions, Mitch opened his presentation with a few facts of interest: FBR Semi-trucks drive the mountains on a regular basis serving small commu-

nities including many resort towns. The beneficiaries include 7% homeless and 50% kids. FBR covers both all of the state of Wyoming and service programs to 30 Colorado counties, providing food supplies for one or two meals a day. Five million dollars from partner agencies help with inventory to associate food banks.

There are many assorted reasons for skipping meals, mostly lack of funds, however. 1 in 10 adults are "food insecure" in Colorado. In the more expensive counties 1 in 8 are "food insecure." The number goes up in Wyoming.

FBR travels 135,000 miles a year delivering food to their 5 food banks across the state.

On a positive note, all area Food Bank associate senior staff meet once a month to share data and planning. In total 145,000 meals are served each day and they assist a million people each year. There are many Partners associated with FBR including 38,000 public volunteers a year, plus a 60 full-time staff.

Smaller food banks may order online and receive a delivery from FBR. Over 70 million pounds of food were delivered last year. Forty percent of FBR Big store partners will drop ship supplies as well. Fresh produce is an intricate part of the delivery process. Truckloads of produce are delivered to the FBR main warehouse for quick distribution and pick-up. FBR trucks are also identified as "Mobile Food Pantries" or a "Food island" and distributed over a wide area.

Kids need food to study well in school. Schools

send food home in back packs and is available to all students. The supplemental amounts of food offered are a "no signup" program at all mobile food tanker units. Food is distributed openly and without bias

Top contributors to FBR are the general public. As they report, \$1 buys 4 meals. Low overhead holds down costs and increases product fulfillment FBR is a champion of fighting food waste. Mitch said 30-40% of food ends up as waste. FBR rescues 18-million pounds from

landfills and is recognized as a Top Nonprofit earning 4 stars.

Meals on Wheels mostly serves elders. FBR meal preparation consists of Paul Fisher and one other helper. 225,000 meals were prepared and distributed last year.

Grocery Companies can now donate discarded product. Dumpster recovery led to this reality. On a sad note, it is common knowledge the military discards tons of food. On a positive note, Starbucks bought a truck for FBR and donates packaged products.

As volunteering is concerned, the Boy Scouts and 9 -News are very active partners. The Boys and Girls Clubs are a beneficiary of FBR at all their metro area clubs. FBR guarantees meals are eatable and nourishing.

A big thank you to Mitch and Paul for their presentation. We hope to be of assistance in the future. And welcome them back anytime.
