Christmas Tree Lot Overview

Joe Marci provides an overview and some instructions for this year's Tree Lot sale. The Tree Lot is the largest fund raiser for the club. It started back in 1978, and we have sold trees for 40 years in pretty much the same spot since that time. We had great sales last year but the club now pays rent, and the rent has increased once again this year.

This year the lot will be in the same location as last year. Some logistics will change as the deliveries will be much larger and storing them will be a challenge.

Thankfully the sales have been good and this good fortune has continued. Joe handed out Guidelines for Selling Trees, which provides the Do's and Don't's - see GUMS distribution email. We do offer free delivery in metro area, and are in need of members to help deliver these. Two more people are involved in the delivery, and often the grateful recipients offer a tip. But, keep in mind, the tips come back to the club. Last year we did about a dozen deliveries.

Last year Lynn Jones opened the lot almost every day, made coffee, and got the place organized for the day to come. Lynn moved to Idaho this past year and we are in need of a new "Lynn Jones" to do this for us this year.

Things have changed regarding how the trees will be delivered this year. We will be getting loads this year in semi-trailers directly from the source. The trees will come again from Michigan and Oregon. The Nobel and Nordman Fir are coming from Oregon, while rest are coming from Michigan. This year we have a large variety of trees, such

as Black Hills Spruce, Balsam, Concolor, Douglas Fir, Fraser Fir, Noble Fir, Nordman, Scotch Pine, and White Pine.

Most of the trees are being cut this month, Joe placing orders for trees back in August. Much has been done already and the wheels are in motion.

The drilling of the trees will be done and with help from the Tamarac Optimist club doing the pricing, plus assistance from Thomas Jefferson High School students.

The morning of possibly the 21st, will be the first delivery. On that date we will need at least 15 guys to help unload, drill the trees, set up the racks. We will also need members/ volunteers with trucks to go over to the storage space to retrieve the supplies. So please get ready and plan to help.

Email from Steve Kady: Denver Firefighters from Station 22 once again climbed the stick to secure the tree lot sign over the old Jiffy Lube sign. Just as they were spreading materials out, the bell went off to a reported fire at 600 South Dayton. Lucky for everyone it was just burnt food. They returned a short time later and got it done.
