Harry Fegley's Travels: Goodwood Revival

Our own Harry Fegley is our speaker this morning. Harry's topic this morning is about his trip this past September to Goodwood Revival.

Goodwood Revival is as popular in England as the Indy 500 is here in the US. Goodwood Estate is guite large, and the story begins with the First Duke of Richmond. His love of hunting led him to Goodwood in the 1690s, where one of the first and most fashionable hunts in the country was

based. Ever since, sport has played a pivotal role here, with golf, cricket, motor racing, horseracing and flying on the estate.

Goodwood Motor Circuit was officially opened in September 1948 when Freddie March, the 9th Duke and renowned amateur racer, tore around the track in a Bristol 400. He received a rapturous response from 15,000 spectators who had come to see the opening of Britain's first professionally organized motor-racing event since before the War. The race continues in popularity and appeal.

Harry had to sign up two-years in advance to book tickets for he and his wife Linda. England is the largest producer in the world of sports cars.

Harry explains that on their first day they went to the Jaguar plant, where you are not allowed to take pictures. They went to the manufacturing plant that makes the Land Rover, and two others, including the Jaguar where humans do not touch the car during the assembly process, until it is painted. Over 800 cars are assembled each day there. It takes 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ days to make each car. After they are painted, workers have to assemble each car. They followed that trip with a visit to the Jaguar museum.

Harry showed us a picture of one car that is one of only six which are still running today. In another photo the 2008 XFR, looks like a regular car, but inside only has one seat, and ran over 200 mph at the Bonneville Flats. He also shows us a replica of a car that ran in the first race, Morgan Car company.

On another tour of a manufacturing plant, Harry shows an aluminum chassis, and how clean the factory floor is. Harry also visited the operation of Desmond J. Smail Ltd. Desmond is affectionately known as "Mr. Aston Martin," telling you everything you need to know. He is one of the most renowned characters in the Aston Martin world, having first worked on the brand in 1976 as an apprentice mechanic. With a reputation as one of the world's leading Aston Martin specialists and a 6,000 ft showroom in Olney, the business continues to go from strength to strength, as Desmond approaches 40 years in the industry. This gentlemen goes around the world to find Austin Marten's that are not working, brings them back to Only England and refinishes them. Business model seems to be working.

Williams Factory is the Formula 1 factory. Williams is one of the world's leading Formula 1 teams. They also visited the Beauliu Museum which boasts: From the earliest motor carriages to classic family saloons, the world-famous National Motor Museum has one of the finest collections of cars, motorcycles and motoring memorabilia in the world. It is as big as Disneyland. One of the special cars was 1903 French car that has 6 horsepower. After all the museums they got to attend the race track to see the lay of the land.


During dinner Harry and his group were joined by drivers of several race cars. As you get to the entrance to the race track, you see people dress up in period costumes and are only allowed in when they are dressed that way. The race is televised throughout England. Steve Atwood, men dressed




up in period costumes as well as women. Entertainers floating around, and over at the BMW tent, if you got bored you could go over to listen to the Ğlenn Miller Band. They also had a vin-

tage airplane show. They have 16 races during the two day event. Harry shows a picture of pedal cars, some of them selling for thousands of dollars.
