#### **Emily Fay** American Diabetes Association Camp Colorado

Ron Gustas introduced our guest speaker, Emily Fay, this morning. Emily is a Territory Director with the American Diabetes Association (ADA). She started off explaining that there are basically four types of diabetes. The first is Type 1 which is often referred to as Juvenile Diabetes. Type 1 is most often diagnosed in children, hence the name juvenile diabetes, but that it can be diagnosed in adults. Type 1 Diabetes is when the pancreas stops producing insulin. Insulin is needed to allow blood sugar to be used by the cells in our body for energy. A Type 1 diabetic is dependent on the injection of insulin into the body so that it can properly function.

The second type is referred to as Type 2 Diabetes. This is when the pancreas still produces insulin, but the body's cells are resistant to the insulin. Type 2 is often controlled by a low carb diet, physical exercise, weight control and oral medication. Most diabetics are Type 2 and become diabetic because of heredity, age and/or obesity.

The third is gestational diabetes. About 10 percent of pregnant women develop gestational diabetes. This does not mean they were diabetic before or will be diabetic after pregnancy. Gestational diabetes is an insulin resist condition much like Type 2.

The final is "pre-diabetes." Pre-diabetes is a condition where the blood sugars are elevated but not to the point that you have diabetes. It is usually the "wake-up call" to Type 2 diabetes.

As part of Emily's role she also serves as the director of the Camp Colorado, a summer camp for Type 1 diabetic children. Because of the extreme monitoring and health care required by a Type 1 diabetic child, it becomes very difficult

for them to enjoy summer camp like a normal child. Camp Colorado provides the medical staff, medical supplies and 24/7 monitoring needed by diabetic kids so that they can attend a summer camp.

There is a one week, over-night camp, and three day-camps available to Type 1 diabetic children. Because of the special needs of these kids, it becomes quite expensive. Emily says the actual cost is about \$1,500 per child. The ADA partially funds the cost to get it down to \$620 per child. Over the last several years Optimist fundraising and donations conducted by the Type 1 Diabetes

Optimist Club cuts that cost in half for 30 to 40 families. Ron Gustas added that this camp not only benefits the children, but gives their parents a much needed break from the constant monitoring that they must do every day.

Our guests Max McMahon and Ellie Knox, both with Type

1 diabetes, took the stage and fielded many questions from the membership about the lifestyle and how it feels to be diabetic. They also addressed the technological advancements that help children cope with diabetes. We thank all of the participants and Emile Fay for a very informative look inside to world of Type 1 Diabet- share their Type 1 diabetes journey ic children.
