Our guess speaker was Major General retired, Jay Lin-



dell who was introduced by **Steve Kady**. Major General Lindell announced with great delight *"It's Great to be in front of people! Thank you for all you do as an organization."* He shared that he had visited our website and was impressed will all the programs and said, it is important work for our kids, community, and nation. The first question he asked was, *"Where were you on 9/11?"* And, then shared that

he was in Germany and recalled someone saying, *"sir look at this."* He looked up at a TV screen in the room just as the 2nd plane flew into Tower 2. It was a starling moment and he knew at that time things were going to change forever.

For the last 7 years Jay has been serving as a consultant and leader of the Colorado Aero Space Initiative, serving as a connector and collaborator within all levels of Government. His universe runs the gamut from local government, State, with Legislative and Congressional delegations all the way up to the White House. One of his favorite groups is the Space Happy Hour group at a Boulder bar. Professionals and scientists gather to discuss the new Space Force and issues attendant to the evolution of our journey into the final frontier, so to speak. ing expanded over 70% in the last ten years. Colorado, especially CU Boulder is the nation's top recipient of NASA research awards. Colorado is the current home and legacy home for the United State Space Command and is #1 in private sector space employment per capital and #2 space economy in the nation. Approximately 148,000 direct jobs have been created, 7.5% of all jobs in Colorado, with \$16.4B labor income with an overall economic impact of \$36.5B.

Colorado Aerospace is a very powerful and historic "Space Inflection Point," radiating numerous benefits and impact, including National Security Space Policy, Civil Space Exploration, General Public Awareness, and Leadership and Technology Advancement among other important factors. Colorado is the temporary US Space Command Base and will hopefully be soon awarded permeant standing due to the 8 out of 9 Space Force Deltas already stationed here. The direct economic impact of the Command is tremendous with an estimated \$1B output and 5,065 new workers earning \$276.1M. GPS development is also another key element to the growth and development of the Space Force. In 2018 the Colorado Air & Space Port was established at the Front Range Air Facility.

Colorado is on the leading edge of Space Force Development and Technology and General Jay Lindell is leading the way in Colorado. It was an extraordinary and enlightening presentation and we hope to see General Jay Lindell again real soon.
