

Major General (Ret) John A. "Andy" Love

Steve Kady introduced our Guest Speaker: Major Gen-



eral (Ret.) Andy Love, son of Colorado's longest serving Governor John Love. Steve added a little flair to the introduction by describing how he and press secretary Feeny Murphy had produced a campaign video they filmed out of a helicopter, showing Governor

Love riding a majestic horse down a steep ridge much like in a "John Wayne scene." It was one of those memorable moments that led to his reelection.

After attending college at Colorado College in Colorado Springs and sowing his oats on the ski slopes of Breckinridge and Aspen as a ski instructor and with an array of hosting engagements he entered the Colorado Air National Guard as a mechanic in April of 1967. Thus he began an extraordinary career in the Colorado Air National Guard (COANG), North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD), and United States Northern Command (NORTHCOM).

The highlight of the program was his emotional and detailed account of the 9-11 attack on the Pentagon. As he shared, he was serving as National Guard Assistant to the Commander, Air Force Space Command (AFSPC) and on assignment in the Pentagon. His office was on the opposite side of the impact area by the hijacked jetliner. He noted, if the plane was on an angle just over 3 degrees higher it would have crashed into his office. It was perhaps the most eventful moment in his career. The photo galley showed how serious the attack was and still remains. Staff and personnel were moved out of the building as quickly as possible and everyone immediately got to work on recovering and

From his first flight in an F-100 that included flying at subsonic speed under 400 feet off the ground, to the F-16 climbing to 20,000 feet after take-off along with 2500 hours of flight service the honorable ascension through the ranks commenced. Love now serves as the Special Assistant to the Combatant Commander, NORAD/NOTHCOM. He also assists the Commander on homeland defense, civil support and aerospace issues under the National Guard's operational range of issues.

General "Andy" Love is a native Coloradan we can all admire and be proud to know. His stories of 37 years in service were a delight and eye-opening to say the least. He has lived a life well tendered and full of optimism. We welcome his smiling face at our door anytime.
