Our Speaker Denise Brown

Colorado Economic Development Commission Board Member

Our speaker today was <u>Denise Brown</u>. Denise is a board member of the Colorado Economic Development Commission. Her career spans over 35 years working in both the public and private sectors in Colorado. Before retiring in 2012, she served as the Interim Executive Director of the Fitzsimons Redevelopment Authority, which is the developer of a bioscience business park affiliated with the University of Colorado.

Prior to this appointment she spent three years as a consultant working with clients such as the University of Colorado, the Colorado Cleantech Industry Association, and the Boettcher Foundation.

Denise served as the first Executive Director of the Colorado BioScience Association. She also served in senior administrative positions for 20 years at the University of Colorado including Executive Assistant to the President of the University and Chief Planning Officer for the CU Health Sciences Center.

Prior to that, Denise worked for the House Majority Office at the Colorado General Assembly for two years. From 1977 through 1984, she worked as Assistant to the Governor of Colorado for Human Services, Director of the Governor's Job Training Office, and in the Office of Appointments to Boards and Commissions.

Denise talked about the Colorado Economic Development Commission, which develops and implements programs for the promotion of economic development in Colorado, and ensures that such economic development programs create employment opportunities for Colorado residents and benefit Colorado companies across the state.

The Economic Development Commission approves incentives from economic development funds to public and private entities throughout the state to help existing businesses expand and new companies locate to Colorado.

Denise shared that the Commission was formed to address the boom and bust nature of our economy in Colorado. Proper planning during the good times will help prepare for the down times. The board has 11 members, appointed by the Governor, the Speaker of the House, and the President of the Senate. One of their objective is to diversify the economy of Colorado by bringing in bio tech and other non-traditional industries.

The commission had three main programs. One is for incentivizing producers and directors to film their movies in Colorado. The program has been controversial, in part be-

cause it is hard to determine if the films were going to come to Colorado anyway.

A second program is to encourage advanced industries by supporting research at CU, CSU, School of Mines, and National Jewish. Grants are given to support early stage companies who don't have access to other funding. The grants also help with the development of high tech infrastructure. The third program is using TIF programs (tax increment financing). This involves giving tax credits for to expanding company or new companies coming to Colorado. These grants are designed to be "but for" grants—

applicants have to prove that Colorado is competing with other states. The commission tries to evaluate if the jobs that would become available are good for the state. Approximately 80 percent of the offers made are accepted and come to our state. Once here, however, not all companies use the incentives. There is a rigorous process of documentation, and not all follow the steps necessary.

Denise took questions, the first of which was around Amazon and their process looking for a second major headquarters, possibly in the Denver area. She indicated that Colorado has started to position for making an offer. The commission works to consolidate and evaluate local city or municipality plans in order to present one united proposal from the state. Companies like Amazon are looking for a package of local incentives, and are concerned about things such as access to airports and housing options for employees. The commission set aside \$10M two years ago for the possibility of an opportunity with a large company like Amazon. Preliminary proposals are due to Amazon by November, and likely their decision will come next summer. They would be eligible for TIF financing, and there is no ceiling on those funds. The jobs used to justify those funds have to be directly created job, and have to be here in Colorado more than 5 years to get the credit. Amazon may bring 50,000 jobs, which led to questions about why Colorado needs to work to attract Amazon, since unemployment is very low and we have infrastructure problems keeping up with our current growth. Denise respects that view, yet feels the commission does not feel they can take their foot on and off the brakes when it comes to these type of opportunities, since the economy and growth will not always be as strong as today.
