# **Brent's Place**



Our speaker this morning was John Paterson the Volunteer Coordinator for Brent's Place. John gave us some background on how the program started and where they are now. Brent's Place now runs three different housing facilities for families and patients being treated for cancer. The facilities are the Founder's House and

Tanners House both owned by Brent's Place on their Aurora Campus; Marion Street where they operate six apartments and the Forum Fitzsimons.

Brent's Place is currently housing a total of 67 families. They believe that the family environment is important to the recovery of the cancer patient, so they are the only organization that allows patients to live with their families. This presents several unique challenges, the foremost being sanitation practices. Since cancer treatment involves drugs that often suppress a patient's immune systems, sanitation becomes vitally important.

Brent's Place was founded by Donn and Linda Eley in 1987. Their son, Brent, was undergoing cancer treatment requiring them to take Brent to Iowa for an extended stay. This presented them with many problems such as not knowing the area, where do they stay, how can they afford the cost of housing the entire family. When they came back to Colorado, they wanted to start an organization that would provide housing and guidance to families that had to come to the Denver area for extended stays but not permanent

residence. For the past 30 years, Brent's Place works to provide housing to these families cost free. Brent's Place gets their funding from health insurance companies, donations, and fundraising activities. Monaco South, led by Paul Bernard, has supported Brent's Place through donations and support at their annual walk fundraiser. Optimists have become experts at cooking a pancake and sausage breakfast for the walkers. John thanked Monaco South for our continued support throughout the years.
