Tom Mauro announced that he still needs two more people to help with the campaign scheduled for Jan. & Feb. If you can help out, please see Tom.

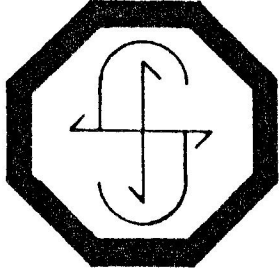
