RAGAS, in partnership with 3Strands Global Foundation and G6 Hospitality LLC, presents Naresh Kumar of the Rotary Club of Guindy, India, with the HERO AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING COURAGE. He embarked on a courageous solo trek across America, self-supported on a tandem bike. Learn more at pedaling4freedom.org.

Naresh Kumar's journey spanned 3500 miles in just 35 days, driven by his unwavering commitment to combat human trafficking, the second largest illicit trade globally. His constant mission is to raise awareness and funds worldwide, supporting efforts to protect children and educate communities.

Why choose a solo journey on a tandem bike? Naresh invites strangers to join him on the second seat, symbolizing the lack of control experienced by trafficking victims. They cannot steer, change gears, or stop-paralleling the control traffickers exert over their victims.

Naresh had the honor of dining with RI President Stephanie Urchek and a select group of Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Monroeville, PA.

WORLD DAY AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS TUESDAY, JULY 30; THEME Is "Accelerated action to end child trafficking" By DR george belitsos ragas board member



Annually, the **United Nations designates July 30 as World Day Against Human Trafficking** in Persons to raise awareness of this devastating global problem and to promote the protection of people's basic human rights. Trafficking is modern-day slavery, and this heinous crime is growing globally.

RAGAS encourages Rotary Clubs and Districts to mark World Day Against Human Trafficking with awareness events and trainings in your club and community. Another idea is to host a town hall meeting to discuss ways that human trafficking is occurring in your community/country and how we can create stronger, safer communities. Invite your sheriff, mayor, police, and other community leaders. Your club could hold a fundraiser for a local HT/MS survivor service NGO.

This year's global campaign for World Day Against Trafficking in Persons urges "accelerated action to end child trafficking." Children represent a significant proportion of trafficking victims worldwide, with girls being disproportionately affected.

1 in 3 victims of human trafficking globally is a child!

The causes of child trafficking are as diverse as the ways in which children are exploited. Children are subjected to various forms of trafficking, including prostitution, exploitation in forced labor, criminality or begging, forced child marriage, and recruitment into armed forces.

Root causes are manifold, including poverty, inadequate support of unaccompanied children amidst rising migration and refugee flows, armed conflicts, dysfunctional families, and parents who sell their own children. Notably, in low-income countries, children are often trafficked for forced labor, whereas in high-income countries, sexual exploitation remains prevalent among child victims.

Please make the Global Day Against Trafficking the day that your Rotary Club becomes part of the solution and stands with RAGAS in the global fight to end HT/MS trafficking. We are aware that several Rotary Clubs are holding virtual trainings and in-person events to mark this special annual day. GRANT EXTENTION TO JULY 30TH, 2024. APPLY NOW



RAGAS is proud to announce its release of a request for proposals to solicit Community Awareness & Prevention Education (CAPE) grant applications/ 2024 makes the third year that RAGAS has launched the CAPE grant opportunity. This request for Proposals for prevention education projects is also posted on our website <u>https://ragas.online/rfp-</u> <u>cape-2024/</u>

Application can either be individual Rotary Clubs or an entire Rotary Districts. **The new deadline for the** grant submission is July **30th, 2024**. The top 10 scoring applications will received 1,000 RAGAS Grant to assist clubs or districts in funding a community prevention education project.

In addition to funding, all grantee will receive:

1.Access to updated Prevention/Education Toolbox and CAPE Global Strategy to help create and execute a CAPE Project

2.Mentoring by designated RAGAS coordinator, ambassador, or a board member to consult on their project and provide support on how to collaborate with partner stakeholders, including local schools, local government, NGO's and other community members.

3.All grantee clubs or districts will be asked to adopt a threeyear pledge committing to take a public stand against human trafficking/modern day slavery.

4.All participating Clubs and Districts will be asked to appoint a human trafficking primary contact at the District and Club level who will help coordinate efforts throughout the grant period and ideally beyond.

With the grant offered by RAGAS in 2023, the EFOHRSC (Ending Forced Organ Harvesting Rotary Satellite Club) of CAAHT (Community Action Against Human Trafficking) conducted the following projects by end of June 2024:

A. "Human Harvest" film screening at Texas A&M University The event was hosted in the afternoon on November 4th, 2023, by the Falun Dafa Club of Texas A&M University and sponsored by EFOHRSC of CAAHT.



After the screening, David Matas, co-founder of The International Coalition to End Transplant Abuse in China (ETAC) joined via live video connection and gave an update on the recent progress of the investigation and answered many questions from the audience.

ANTI-TRAFFICKING INTERNATIONAL 2024 CONFRENCE



In 2013, the Northern Virginian suburbs of Washington, DC, were the stomping grounds to some of the most dangerous gangs in the country. Despite their presence in some of the country's wealthiest and most well-educated counties, citizens were unaware that these gangs were trafficking young women and men, many of them teenagers from local high schools, for sex. This became a turning point for the localities that were affected and state of Virginia, which did not have a codified statute recognizing human trafficking at that time. It was from these events that Anti-Trafficking International (ATI) got its roots.

In 2013-2015, law enforcement, educators, community organizations, and local citizens launched a public outreach and awareness campaign with the goal of addressing a recognized need in educating the community about the prevalence of human trafficking. What was originally called the Just Ask Prevention Project became Anti-Trafficking International in 2021 to better reflect its global reach. ATI provides prevention education to communities, schools, and front-line professionals. It also consults with other organizations overseas who are seeking to implement prevention programs in areas that are highly susceptible to trafficking. It is only through education that we can get ahead of the problem.

ATI's mission is to stop human trafficking before it starts, and we are proud that our prevention programs have reached over 350,000 students around the world, more than 20,000 front line professionals, and thousands of community folks who are interested in protecting the places they work and live. This past year, with the generous support of RAGAS, ATI trained teachers in Warren County Virginia to deliver our Just Ask Prevention curriculum to grades 6-10. The introduction of the curriculum was warmly received by the school board, administration, and teachers. Many long time residents noted that the rural counties of the state are seeing problems that used to be only in the NOVA counties, and most kids are too naïve to recognize manipulation and grooming.

ATI is grateful for our partnership with RAGAS and its continuing commitment to fighting human trafficking. Together, we will be stronger in our fight to irradicate this scourge on humanity.

NATIONAL TRAFFICKING SHELTERED ALLIANCE TO EXPAND ITS ALLIANCE REFERRAL SYSTEM WITH THE HELP OF ROTARY

The Parole Rotary Club of Annapolis and Rotary District 7620 have awarded the National Trafficking Sheltered Alliance \$12,000 in grants to expand the NTSA Alliance Referral System(ARS.) ARS is a network of over 100 shelters across the United States dedicated to enhancing resources and increasing access to care for survivors of human trafficking. NTSA's Alliance Referral System (ARS) bridges gaps between trafficking survivors in need and the shelters that walk alongside them on their healing journeys. The goal of the grants is to leverage the Rotary network and deep community ties to help identify candidate organizations to serve the needs of survivors of human trafficking.



Estimates show that there are likely up to 300,000 people being trafficked right here in the US. It is reported that less than 1% of those victims receive the aftercare they need to thrive. This problem generates a desperate need for thousands of survivors to find a safe place where they can heal and experience high quality, traumainformed care.

With just one <u>online</u> form, the ARS team matches survivors' individual needs to the available shelters in their network of 100+ services within 24 hours. **Each referral represents a survivor in need taking a brave and powerful step on their healing journey after experiencing significant trauma within the commercial sex trade.** Each one is an individual with their own story, hopes, and dreams - all from different walks of life - but all seeking a similar path towards a new beginning. For these survivors, placement in a shelter means access to trauma therapy job training, a safe place to stay, and even legal services. As the anti-trafficking field continues to evolve, NTSA is leading the charge to expand ARS into an even larger and more comprehensive resource - onboarding new shelters to provide more options to survivors across the country. To date, this program has facilitated over 2,000 referrals for survivors in need with a 30% average growth rate each year.

Looking forward, the anti-trafficking field urgently requires a tech solution connecting survivors with comprehensive services nationwide. NTSA's inprogress mobile app will streamline the current process of connecting survivors with residential programs and give survivors direct access to making their own referrals. This mobile app matches survivors with tailored resources based on individual needs like supervision level, faith preference, and location.

As NTSA and Rotary joined forces, the focus was not just on expanding the network but on identifying and addressing specific gaps in services. Through concentrated efforts, the partnership has yielded remarkable outcomes, ensuring that no survivor is left behind:

Filling Crucial Gaps: Recognizing the diverse needs of survivors, the ARS team identified several key gaps, including male survivor care, support for the LGBTQ+ community, assistance for minors, and services for individuals with disabilities. With the support of the Rotary grants, NTSA has been able to strategically fill these gaps, ensuring that every survivor receives the care and support they deserve.

Expanding Network and Connections: The grants provided by the Rotary has enabled NTSA to attend conferences, share valuable insights, and forge connections with providers and services across the field. This networking has not only strengthened NTSA's position but has also facilitated partnerships with organizations catering exclusively to specific demographics. Noteworthy additions include Bob's House of Hope, addressing the needs of male survivors, and Forgotten Children, serving undocumented foreign nationals. Additionally, Reclaim 13 has joined the network, specializing in services for minors.

Knowledge Sharing and Training: Beyond expanding the network, NTSA has leveraged the grant funding to provide HT 101 training to new organizations and services. This capacity-building initiative ensures that frontline responders are equipped with the necessary tools and knowledge to effectively support survivors and combat trafficking in all its forms.

The impact of this partnership extends far beyond the numbers—it's about creating a more inclusive, responsive, and effective support system for survivors of human trafficking. Through collaboration and dedication, NTSA and Rotary are not only bridging gaps but also building bridges of hope and healing for those who need it most.
