Imagine this: a 15-year-old girl in a remote mountain village is offered a job that promises to help her support her family. She's hopeful. She dreams bigger. But instead of opportunity, she walks straight into exploitation. This story plays out far too often in Vietnam's Điện Biên Province, where human traffickers prey on families facing poverty and limited choices. Now, imagine if that story could have ended differently—because your club chose to act.

Introducing Project Dignity (GG2577183)- An \$800,000 Rotary International and World Vision Project

This is a \$800,000 global grant powered by Rotary International and World Vision. The goal? To prevent trafficking before it happens, protect those most at risk, and walk alongside survivors as they rebuild their lives with dignity and hope.

We already have strong support from key Rotary leaders and clubs, and World Vision has committed to matching our \$400,000 fundraising goal—dollar for dollar.



Human trafficking generates over US\$150 billion a year and is the second-largest criminal industry in the world after drug trafficking. It is a high-demand, low-risk crime. Human trafficking in Vietnam has reached alarming levels, with nearly 3,500 cases uncovered between 2010 and June 2021, impacting approximately 7,500 victims, over 90% of whom are women and children.1 This underscores the need for an immediate and stronger intervention to combat forced labor and sexual exploitation

#### **Changing Lives**

Every person deserves a life free from violence and exploitation. Rotary and World Vision are working together to combat traffi cking of women and children by equipping them, their communities, and local partners with eff ective approaches to prevent the exploitation of the most vulnerable, protect those who have been victimized, and increase access to justice and critical care. Project Dignity is a 2-year, global grant that will focus on the most vulnerable children and youth, including from ethnic minorities, poor families, and remote areas. Many of them lack parental care and are desperate for work opportunities. The project will educate children, youth, and parents on what traffi cking is and the recruitment techniques traffi ckers use. It will facilitate learning on life skills, safe migration, online safety, vocational training, and leadership development. Families will receive home visits and livelihood support to meet children's immediate needs. The project will strengthen the capacity of protection systems and community-based networks to identify victims and at-risk children. It will support community-based social protection and referrals while seeking justice for victims.







#### **Key Partnerships**

Project Dignity will be managed by the Rotary Club of Danang and World Vision Vietnam. As the world's largest service organization, Rotary has unprecedented reach. World Vision works in nearly 100 countries with over 30,000 staff serving the world's poorest and most vulnerable communities. In Vietnam, World Vision has partnered with government and community stakeholders since 2007 to protect vulnerable populations from trafficking and strengthen protective environments for children. World Vision will match Rotary's \$400,000 contribution toward an \$800,000 budget for this critical project.



#### **Project Location**

A large proportion of the world's trafficking cases occur in Asia, particularly across the Greater Mekong sub-region. The program will target traffi cking hotspots in Vietnam's Diện Biên province, which borders Laos and China. Human traffi cking in Diện Biên is a growing crisis, with traffi ckers preying on ethnic minority communities trapped in poverty, making them highly vulnerable to scams and exploitation. Traffi cking victims-especially young girls and boys-are lured with false promises of jobs or marriage and taken across borders for exploitation. From December 2023 to November 2024, authorities recorded 5 traffi cking cases involving 39 victims—a signifi cant increase from the previous year. This is only counting the cases recorded by local authorities—many more remain unseen and unheard.

#### **Project Goal and Outcomes**

The goal of Project Dignity is to significantly improve the well-being of women and children by reducing the prevalence of trafficking and exploitation and supporting survivors to rebuild their lives. This will occur through four areas of focus:

#### **Prevention:**

- Educate children, youth, parents, and caregivers on traffi cking risks, online safety, safe employment search and migration, and self-protection.
- Support children's groups and leadership development opportunities in schools and communities.
- Equip youth with vocational training and connect them with legal recruiters and employers.
- Organize campaigns on safe migration and online safety.

#### **Protection:**

- Build the capacity of local government and other collaborators in the identification of trafficking victims, youth at risk, and home visits.
- Train local government and service providers in case management, counseling, and referral.
- Support reintegration of victims and returnees by linking them with legal and medical assistance, counseling, and livelihood development assistance.
- Conduct home visits with individuals and families to support development of life plans

#### **Prosecution**

- Train law enforcement staff on child-friendly investigation procedures and a victim-centered approach.
- Facilitate legal support for traffi cking victims and juvenile off enders during investigation and prosecution.



#### **Partnership**

- Build protection-focused partnerships among government agencies, service providers, companies, and other community-based actors
- Develop a joint action plan to address human trafficking and connect victims to services.

## REPORT ON STAKEHOLDERS WORKSHOP: ROTARY CLUB OF KOLOLO IN PARTNERSHIP WITH SEED UGANDA AND BULENGA MODERN PRIMIARY SCHOOL WITH SUPPORT FROM ROTARY ACTION GROUP AGAINST SLAVERY

Theme: Education as a Tool to fight Child Trafficking and Enslavement

Held at Bulenga Modern Primary School

On 1st March 2025, a workshop on Education as a Tool to Fight Child Trafficking and Enslavement was successfully conducted at Bulenga Modern Primary School. The event was organized by the Rotary Club of Kololo- Kampala in collaboration with the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery (RAGAS), SEED Uganda, and Bulenga Modern Primary School. The workshop aimed to raise awareness about child trafficking and enslavement, highlight the role of education in preventing these vices, and equip stakeholders with practical strategies to safeguard children.

The workshop was well attended by 162 children and 19 teachers from different schools, 41 parents, 15 Community leaders and 16 Rotarians, demonstrating a strong community commitment to protecting children from exploitation. School that attended included; Bulenga Modern Primary School, Right Way Nursery and Primary School Bulenga, Excellence Primary School Bulenga, His Will Primary School Bulenga, Kikaaya College School Bulenga, Quality Care Primary School Bulenga, Chosen Generation Primary School and Buloba Valley College.

2. Objectives of the Workshop

#### The primary objectives of the workshop were:


- i) To educate participants on the dangers, causes, and consequences of child trafficking and enslavement.
- ii) To highlight the role of education in reducing the vulnerability of children to trafficking.
- iii) To empower parents, teachers, cultural leaders, religious leaders and local leaders with knowledge and strategies to identify and combat child trafficking.
- iv) To foster partnerships among stakeholders to enhance child protection efforts in the community.



## REPORT ON STAKEHOLDERS WORKSHOP


The workshop was officially opened by Rotarian Kaguma William, the president of the Rotary Club of Kololo- Kampala, who emphasized Rotary's commitment to fighting child trafficking and enslavement through education and community engagement.

He highlighted the role teachers play in making children love school, encouraged leaders to help us implement all rules and regulations that help guide and protect the children, called upon the parents to treasure and treat children well and the learners to be serious with their studies.



The director Bulenga Modern Primary School and Director SEED Uganda, Mr.Semwogerere Patrick provided in insight into the role played by the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery (RAGAS) and the Rotary Club of Kololo - Kampala, in sponsoring the workshop. He talked about the impact of child trafficking and enslavement by giving a real-life case shared by a former parent of the school whose daughter fell victim of the vice and spent over a year in prison; all his to illustrate the severity of the problem and the urgent need for intervention.
