

I am once again on the road. I'm writing this on Independence Day from Grass Valley, where an old army buddy lives. We are camped out overnight here and will be heading into the Sierras tomorrow morning. I have, for years, tried to get Bob, my Grass Valley friend, to join us up at our chosen camping spot. He, however, refers to camping as staying in Motel 6. I don't get it, living that close to the Sierras. He is, though, really good for the room overnight and really good conversation.

My subject for this column is once again community service. I had been thinking of my cousin **Mona**. Her birthday was yesterday, July 3rd. She passed away last year. Mona was a PK (preacher's kid) and had decided she liked the business. As a good Southern Baptist, this did mean that the pulpit was out. Southern Baptists still frown on women in the pulpit.

She went to school at Grand Canyon College, a private Christian school in Phoenix, where she met her future husband **Keith**. He, too, was from a family of religious professionals. He was from a Salvation Army family, though at the time he had decided against joining the Army.

They both graduated and found employment in Las Vegas. Mona worked for the State of Nevada, and Keith became the music minister of a large non-denominational church. Both were rewarding jobs. Both were dissatisfied. I remember talking to them when I had made one of my infrequent trips to Vegas in order to make a fortune at the casino tables.

You know something is wrong when the first subject of conversation was how both were not happy doing what they were doing. I had always thought that people in the "religion" business were happy, but that's not always the case. All I could be was a good listener. This was beyond my area of expertise.

Things change. The very next year I was back in Vegas (this time on business) and went to visit. Both had joined the Salvation Army. They were very happy, and somehow the 80-90 hour work weeks were just part of the adventure.

Mona and Keith spent the rest of their lives in the Army. Their final destination was the management of the Salvation Army retirement home in Phoenix. Really retired in place. By then, they were Colonel **Keith McCreevy** and Mrs. Colonel **Mona McCreevy**. A life well spent for not much reward, except joy in what they accomplished. They also got to travel. Just like the U.S. Army, the Salvation Army moves its officers around. In 40 years, they had been stationed in ten different locations.

They both have since been, as the Salvation Army calls it, promoted to Glory.

The point I'm attempting to make here, aside from the obvious old saw that "Money can't buy happiness", is that community service creates self-satisfaction. As I like to say, I'll do this until it's not fun anymore. Let's not be afraid to tell people that we do community service projects because it's good for our psyche, as well as the community.

New Jersey's Mulhaul Elected President of Kiwanis

Results also include Hope Markes as President-Elect and Cathy Szymanski as Vice President

Michael Mulhaul of Interlaken, New Jersey, was elected President and **Hope Markes** of Hanover, Jamaica, was elected President-Elect during the House of Delegates at the 2025 Kiwanis International Convention in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. **Cathy Szymanski** of Erie, Pennsylvania was elected Vice President.

Timothy Sheppard of Cheyenne, Wyoming, and **Amy Zimmerman** of Beavercreek, Ohio, were elected Trustees for the United States and Pacific Canada Region. Also joining the board in October for three-year terms will be **Shinichi Yoshikuni** of Tokyo, Japan, who was elected as a Trustee for the Asia-Pacific Region during the Kiwanis International Asia-Pacific Convention in March; and **Jon-Fadri Huder** of Samedan, Switzerland, who was elected as a Trustee for the Europe Region during the 2025 Kiwanis International Europe Convention in May.

Mulhaul has been a Kiwanis member for 33 years. A member of the Kiwanis Club of Greater Parsippany, New Jersey, he has served as its President and Treasurer. He is also a member of the Kiwanis Club of Asbury Park, which he helped charter. He has been both District Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the New Jersey District and is currently President of the New Jersey District Foundation and a Kiwanis Children's Fund trustee. Mulhaul and his wife and fellow Kiwanian, **Laura**, have three adult children, a son-in-law, and a grandchild.

Markes, a member of the Kiwanis Club of Hopewell in Hanover, Jamaica, was Governor of the Eastern Canada and Caribbean District in 2013-14 and previously served as Lieutenant Governor. She was also a member of the district's Strategic Planning Committee and was Regional Vice Chair for "The Formula," a membership growth initiative of Kiwanis International. She also has served on the Membership and Education committees. At the club level, she twice served as President. She served as Secretary and Chair of the Fundraising, Membership, and Interclub committees. Markes will serve as Kiwanis International President in 2026-27.

Szymanski has been a Kiwanis member since 1994. Her home club is the Kiwanis Club of Erie, Pennsylvania, where she has served as Distinguished President and Secretary. She was elected a Kiwanis International Trustee in 2019. During her tenure, she served as the board's membership chair and as a counselor for Circle K International, the Kiwanis program for college students. Szymanski was a Distinguished Governor of the Pennsylvania District in 2011-12, following terms as Distinguished Lieutenant Governor and District Membership Chair.

All of the Kiwanians above begin their terms on October 1st, 2025.

The House of Delegates also voted on proposed amendments to the Kiwanis International Bylaws. The following amendments were approved:

- **Proposed Amendment 1: Language Cleanup and District Submission of Resolutions.** Submitted by the Kiwanis International Board, this amendment will clarify the current language of the Kiwanis International Bylaws requiring districts to be in good standing in order to submit resolutions. With the rewording, districts and clubs also can better understand the deadline for submission of resolutions.
- **Proposed Amendment 2: Regional Boards to Propose Resolutions and Amendments.** Submitted by the Kiwanis International Board, this amendment will allow the boards of Kiwanis regions (such as Asia-Pacific and Europe) to propose resolutions and amendments, beginning October 1st, 2025.
- **Proposed Amendment 3 – Remote Voting for Kiwanis International Business –** this amendment was not approved. Submitted by the Capital District Board, this amendment was submitted to provide for candidate nominations and initial review of proposed amendments and resolutions at the Kiwanis International Convention, with final voting via secure remote voting.

The next Kiwanis International Convention will be held in Manila, capital city of the Philippines, June 25th – 27th, 2026. Subsequent International Conventions are scheduled for Dallas (2027) and Las Vegas (2028).

Pittsburgh Proves Itself as a Convention Destination

Fair or not, Pittsburgh has developed a reputation as a blue-collar, industrial setting that is less than appealing as a host city for a Convention. However, as attendees of last month's Kiwanis International Convention discovered, the Downtown setting and the natural beauty of the area make the Steel City a hidden gem amongst the coal mines.

For the first time in its 110-year history, Kiwanis International made Pittsburgh the site of its annual International Convention, and the David Lawrence Convention Center was certainly up to the task. A thoroughly modern venue nestled among buildings more than a century old, the Convention Center was everything Kiwanis members could have hoped for – particularly the air conditioning! With scattered showers giving way to thunderstorms, it was good to get out of the weather and into our workshops.

Delegates to the Convention were scattered across several hotels in the area, with most of the Cal-Nev-Ha District assigned to the Renaissance Hotel, about six blocks west of the Convention hall. It was an arduous walk between the hotel and the Convention Center, with lots of loose bricks that caused one local member to stumble and suffer a black eye. The hotel itself, however, was a classically beautiful building dating back to 1906.

Of course, the number one attraction in town is PNC Park, home of the Pittsburgh Pirates of Major League Baseball. Hundreds of Kiwanians visited the ballpark – even many who aren't baseball fans. Those who participated enjoyed delicious food, incredible lightning shows in the distance beyond home plate, and a special drone show tribute to Pittsburgh's favorite neighbor, **Fred Rogers**.

More than 1,800 delegates representing over 750 Kiwanis Clubs around the world converged on Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania last month to elect new leaders, to learn more about leadership and membership, and to celebrate their achievements over the past year. Over 120 of these Kiwanians traveled from the Cal-Nev-Ha District, including **John and Valerie Crawford**, and **Alan Young** (with his wife, **Grace**), representing G.A.G. Kiwanis.

International President **Lee Kuan Yong** from the Kiwanis Club of Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, welcomed the crowd during the opening session with his famous “Wow!” expression, with arms open wide. His infectious enthusiasm and love for Kiwanis was a constant inspiration to his fellow members from around the world. Other delegates were present from faraway places like Australia, Bermuda, India, Jamaica, Nepal, Panama, and next year’s host nation, the Philippines.

The biggest surprise of the convention was certainly at the opening session on Thursday morning, when President Lee Kuan took to the stage and announced that our featured Keynote Speaker, actor **Martin Sheen**, had to cancel with just four days’ notice due to a family emergency. The disappointment in the Convention hall quickly turned to excitement when the news arrived that a new speaker had been secured at the last minute – none other than Pittsburgh Steelers Hall of Fame quarterback and FOX Sports analyst **Terry Bradshaw**! The four-time Super Bowl champion, a beloved figure throughout Pittsburgh, gave a speech that was rousing, inspirational, largely improvisational, and at times hilarious. Bradshaw alternated between football memories from the 1970s (including a motivational story about former Dallas Cowboys coach **Tom Landry** and his quarterback, **Roger Staubach**) and a sincere appreciation for Kiwanis members and their impact around the world. The 76-year-old NFL star brought down the house, although some of his message was lost on some of the international audience, unfamiliar with American football.

While there was no dues increase on the table for this year, the House of Delegates was not without its controversy. For at least the fourth time in the last ten years, remote voting was defeated with significantly less support than the same proposal had last year. The proposal, if passed, would have allowed Kiwanis members around the world to participate in the House of Delegates online, and without having to attend a Convention. The proposal required two-thirds of the vote in order to pass; it just barely cleared fifty percent.

Another topic of considerable contention was the new Kiwanis Voices program introduced by incoming International President **Michael Mulhaul** of New Jersey. Already having been approved by the International Board of Trustees, the new Kiwanis Voices program will allow young people (age 18-26) to form their own Kiwanis Clubs without having to enroll in college and join Circle K. Although Kiwanis already accepts members as young as 18 years old, Mulhaul explained that 98 percent of our Key Club graduates either do not go on to college, or choose not to join Circle K at their chosen college or university. Although President-Elect Mulhaul and two past Presidents of Kiwanis International argued their case at two different seminars, it was clear that a large number of Circle K advisors and administrators consider the new program to be in direct competition with Circle K, and are unhappy with the way the new program was unveiled. *(Learn more about the new Kiwanis Voices program on Page 11 of this newsletter.)*

For many delegates from the Cal-Nev-Ha District, the only real disappointment at the Convention was with the election results, as San Diego’s own **Gary Jander** took second place in his campaign for International Vice President. Falling just four percent shy of victory, Gary was unable to overcome a distinct home advantage for **Cathy Szymanski** of Erie, Pennsylvania, just a short two-hour drive from Pittsburgh.

Gene gave 56 years of his life to our club, setting records for longevity along the way, but also inspiring countless others to join our club or serve in a leadership role within our organization.

Gene's wife, **Wanda**, did not want a formal memorial service, but still we felt an obligation to say "farewell" and "thank you" to the last of our World War II veterans.



Many of our members took an opportunity to share their thoughts on Gene, who spent more time as a member of our club than any other member. Club President **Jim Akin**, along with Past Presidents **Gary Blume**, **Kathy Butterstein**, **John Chandler**, and **John Crawford** all had plenty of wonderful things to say about Gene, and Wanda was there to share some of her thoughts as well. We presented Wanda with a beautiful bouquet and reminded her that she will forever be part of our Kiwanis family.



June 26th – Taking Care of Our Favorite Local Waterway

Even though several of our club members were out of town, either on vacation or in attendance at the Kiwanis International Convention in Pittsburgh, we still had a fun meeting and a delicious meal prepared as always by our House Committee Chairman, **Gary Blume!**

Club President **Jim Akin** called the meeting to order, and we were soon reminded of our plans for Independence Day! Not only did we hear about our plans to raise the flags on Waring Road for the holiday, but we were all invited to the home of **John and Pam Chandler** for their annual holiday party at their home in La Mesa. This is always John's favorite holiday and the Chandlers enjoy hosting a potluck at their place each year.

Our guest speaker today was **Rob Hutsel**, who has spoken to us before. He is the CEO and President of the San Diego River Park Foundation, a charitable organization dedicated to the conservation of one of our area's greatest natural resources, the San Diego River.

The San Diego River flows from its source near Julian down through Ramona, Lakeside, and Santee, then into Mission Valley through Mission Trails Regional Park. It is historically significant as a fresh water source for the indigenous Kumeyaay people and later for the Franciscan missionaries, the first European settlers in the area.

With the goals of "Connect, Create, and Conserve," the River Park Foundation has made tremendous progress on its goals in recent years. They have opened a new Visitor Center at Grant Park in Mission Valley. They have also gained land grants to help realize their vision of a single, continuous pathway, allowing people to hike or bicycle from the headwaters of the river to its outlet in Mission Bay.

"The program was excellent with many slides and a lot of positive questions and answers," recalled club member **Vic Enchelmayer**.

We thank Mr. Hutsel for coming back to speak with us again. We will be helping the River Park Foundation at one of their upcoming events on Sunday, July 13th starting at noon at Grant Park. We will be serving hamburgers from our cook trailer to some of the foundation's best donors and volunteers.

New Pilot Program Aims to Attract Younger Kiwanians

Many delegates at the Kiwanis International Convention last month were briefed for the first time on a new pilot program that was approved only just two months ago by the International Board.

Known as “Kiwaniis Voices,” the new program is geared toward students who have graduated from Key Club but may choose not to attend college where there is a Circle K club in existence. 2025-26 Kiwanis International President **Michael Mulhaul** gave several reasons why he hopes this experimental new approach may win over new Kiwanians for a new generation.

Mulhaul estimates that some 70,000 Key Club members graduate from high school each year, but less than two percent of those end up making the transition to Circle K. This leaves approximately 68,500 Key Club graduates every year who do not continue serving in the Kiwanis Family.

There are many possible reasons for this, including students who choose to attend a trade school or two-year community college where there is no Circle K club; some may take a “gap year” before continuing their education, while others might continue with a family business or open a new business of their own. Many Key Clubbers, as was pointed out during one of the Convention workshops, only join Key Club so that they can put in on their college application so they can get into college in the first place, seeing no value in continuing with organization once that goal is achieved.

Circle K membership continues to be down significantly since the COVID-19 pandemic, with fewer than 6,000 Circle K members worldwide. Operating expenses for keeping the collegiate-level club afloat have been running at a significant deficit despite Kiwanis investing thousands upon thousands of dollars into the program each year.

Incoming President Mulhaul notes that membership in K-Kids and Builders Club has seen a significant uptick since the pandemic, and believes it is only a matter of time before these young members grow up to become Key Club members themselves. “It’s certainly possible that we could have 500,000 Key Clubbers in just a few years,” he explained. “That would mean 125,000 graduates every year.”

Fielding questions from an audience made up largely of current Circle K members, advisors, and alumni, Mulhaul was careful to point out that the new Kiwanis Voices program would not necessarily compete with Circle K, as it would instead target young adults aged 18-26 who are not enrolled in a major college or university.

Members of Kiwanis Voices would pay only \$40 per year in membership dues, and would be considered members of Kiwanis International. They would be able to vote and attend conventions, hold their own meetings and projects, but would “age out” of the program once they turn 27. These members would then need to join a traditional Kiwanis Club.

Tim will officially take over his new position following Mark McDonald’s retirement, effective October 1st.

Division Realignment Approved for San Diego


Slight Impact to Division 21; Division 11 Eliminated Effective October 1st

The Cal-Nev-Ha Kiwanis District Board of Trustees approved a proposal last month from the Realignment Committee that will re-draw the division boundaries for Region 1 (San Diego County).

The most significant change, effective October 1st, is that Division 11 will cease to exist, with most of its clubs being reallocated to Division 31 (East County). District bylaws specify that a division must have a minimum of nine active clubs or 250 members in order to function as a division. Division 11 (South Bay) has been short of those goals for several years. After a two-year probationary period in which the division was given an opportunity to build new clubs, or boost its existing clubs, six of the seven clubs in Division 11 will be welcomed into Division 31 for the next Kiwanis year.

The major exception is the Downtown San Diego Kiwanis Club, the first Kiwanis Club in our city. Chartered in 1920, the San Diego club is home to current District Governor **Doug Frost**, and boasts an impressive history of leadership and service to San Diego. Its most well-known project today is the Laurels For Leaders luncheon, an annual event which recognizes ASB Presidents from high schools throughout San Diego County. The San Diego Club has been meeting within Division 21 for years, and will be reassigned accordingly.

The realignment will strengthen both Division 21 and 31 so that hopefully no further realignment will be needed for many years.

Turn Back the Clock

Take a look back into the history of G.A.G. Kiwanis!
Special thanks to *Mary Haas* for maintaining our club archives.

Fifty years ago (July 1975) – On July 12th, G.A.G. Kiwanis hosted its 9th Annual Pancake Breakfast at the Allied Gardens Shopping Center on Waring Road (where Grocery Outlet and Ideal Plumbing are located today). **Floyd Lee** and **Jerry Musicant** served as co-chairs of the fundraiser. For the first time, G.A.G. Kiwanis sold advertising space on placemats for the event, and at just \$10 per space, all available spaces were sold out. We also had a local celebrity attend as “**Jack**” from Jack in the Box was there to shake hands and meet the public.

Twenty years ago (July 2005) – Back before the First Friday Concerts in the Park, other outdoor events took place in Allied Gardens every summer. On July 24th, for example, it was the Tifereth Israel Community Orchestra taking the stage for a live performance. Kiwanis members were there in attendance, selling refreshments and trying to recruit new members, while the orchestra played into the night for a crowd that gathered before sunset. Some of the musical selections included a **John Philip Sousa** march (“*The Stars and Stripes Forever*”), a medley from “*The Lion King*,” Disney’s popular animated release from 1994, and the Rogers & Hammerstein classic “*The King and I*.” Among those in attendance from Kiwanis, either to work or to take in the show: **Lee Agsten**, **John Crawford**, **Dorothy Dougherty**, **Bob Frankhouser**, **Ron Levingston**, **John Peterson**, **Jack Scott**, **Kevin Stone**, **Dan Yelvington**, and **Debbie Yost**.

Ten years ago (July 2015) – After a spirited debate at a club meeting, members of G.A.G. Kiwanis voted by a margin of 18-7 to permanently close the Christmas Tree Lot. The Tree Lot had been in business for 26 years – each time overseen by **John Chandler** – but the rising costs of trees combined with the difficulty in finding able-bodied volunteers proved to be an unsurmountable obstacle.

Five years ago (July 2020) – With their annual Independence Day celebration canceled due to COVID-19, members of the G.A.G. Kiwanis Club brought some patriotic cheer to the La Mesa home of **John and Pam Chandler**. Club members decorated their vehicles and drove past the Chandler residence with their horns honking and flags waving... Elsewhere, **Johnny Pernicano**, a longtime member of the Pacific Beach Kiwanis Club, passed away on July 23rd at age 92. The charismatic musician was part of the famous Pernicano family of restaurant owners, and a survivor of a harrowing 1958 plane crash.
